At the annual convocation of the Presbyterian college, Montreal, held on the 3rd Inst., the degree of D. D. was conferred on the Rev. J. G. McIvor, of St. Luke's church, Okotoks. Dr. McIvor, much of whose early training was obtained in Europe, studied under some of the most famous teachers in the old country, including Lord Kelvin, whose remains were laid to rest last December in Westminster Abbey; the late Sir Richard Jebb, the foremost Greek scholar of his day; and Dr. Edward Caird, until recently the master of Balliol college, Oxford, the greatest living representative of modern Scottish philosophy. After graduating M.A. and B.D. at Edinburgh, Dr. McIvor spent four years in a post graduate study, chiefly at American universities. In 1896 the Presbyterian college, Montreal, conferred on him the honorary degree B.D. During his recent residence at Yale university he engaged in scientific research work, embodying a thesis presented last year to the college at Montreal. In consequence of the distance of the recipient from the college, the degree was conferred in absentia.—Calgary Times Dr. McIvor is well known in P.E.I. land having been for some years a pastor of West and Clyde River.

Other massive machines have been put in, and before long the workshops will be in operation. A regular transformation will have then been effected in the appearance of the railway property, which when the new wharf is finished will be equal to the best public works in any part of Canada.
