MUNIFICENT GIFTS TO M'GILL

Many Splendid Donations During the Past Year. The Annual Report Shows Progress.

Another prosperous year has just closed for McGill University, as is shown by the annual report just issued. By far the most striking events of the year were the magnificent donations of Sir William Macdonald, chairman of the Board of Governors, who gave during the year \$125,000 and a valuable site for the erection of a "student's union," to be used for the purposes of amusement and social intercourse. Sir William in addition to this has given \$2,000 for experimental work carried on in the Physics Building; \$1,000 for Philosophical Works and Periodicals; \$250 for Experimental Psychology; \$50 for new Philosophical Works; \$250 for North Western MSS.; \$2,000 for four Travelling Scholarships in the Faculty of Law; \$5,000 to provide annually \$200 for the teaching of Experimental Psychology; and \$50 for the purchase of Philosophical literature; \$1,500 for the Macdonald Auxiliary Fund; \$500 as a contribution to the cost of the Summer School of French; and \$500 for an assistant to the professor of Zoology. Amongst other leading benefactors of the University is Peter Redpath, who gave \$10,000 for the maintenance of its library.

NUMBER OF STUDENTS.
 There were 1,158 students enrolled, 415 in medicine, 400 in art (including 159 women), 388 in applied science and 45 in law.
 During the year 211 degrees were conferred, 86 M. D.'s, 14 B. C. L., 52 B. Sc., in the applied science course, 47 B. A., and various other honors, while the honorary degree of L. L. D. was conferred upon five persons.

The students have been drawn from every province of the Dominion and many foreign lands as well. Ontario leads in Arts, with 126 students; while Quebec leads in applied science, with 118. The United States sent 42 Arts students, but only ten for the science course. England, British Guiana and Persia had one representative apiece in the Arts course, while the West Indies sent nine. There were eight Englishmen taking the science course, and one apiece from Scotland, Australia, Burma and British Guiana.

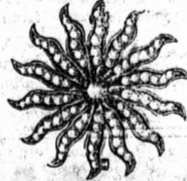
THE RAILWAY DEPARTMENT.
