—ANOTHER ISLANDER KILLED.—The following is an extract from a letter written by J. McCormack, a New England soldier in an English hospital, and published in the Boston Post of January 6th:—"It was a rough time in Belgium this fall, awful mud. We were on the Ypres front, where the advance was on. There were a lot of dead and wounded and it was a hard place to get a wounded man out of. We had two of our machine gun crew killed, one outright. There was a little life in the other fellow, (his name was Willie Riley, from P.E.I.) We started on the dressing station with him under very heavy shell fire but he died when we were half way; the other fellow was an English chap. We buried them both that same evening at the foot of the Ridge. It was all done quickly for we were under shell fire all the time. A little wooded cross marks the spot."

### Great Britain Will Call Younger Men

LONDON, January 15.—Nearly half a million men from Great Britain alone are to be recruited into the British Army at the earliest date possible, and it is probable that many more will be added to that number in the coming months. These will comprise the younger men, who up to the present have been exempt because of their employment in industries essential to the war services. This announcement was made in the House of Commons by Sir Auckland Geddes, Minister of National Service, whose statement of the Government's man power proposals were replete with interesting details of Britain's strength in the struggle into which she means to throw her full resources. The Minister set forth the status and needs of the British fighting and munitioning forces and the measures the Government is taking after agreement with most of the labor leaders recruitment from the classes of skilled workers who were promised exemption when conscription was adopted. Sir Auckland prefaced his remarks on the Government's man power proposals by the declaration

that nothing could be more misleading than the suggestion that the man-power problem could be solved by a drastic stroke. It was the central problem of the war. "It means everything," he said. "Ships, armies, munitions, food, light, heat and coal. At the moment the most anxious problem is not the supply of men for the army. But we have to make steps against the time when it will be a time, which I believe, is not far distant."

#### The Plain Facts.

Going into the details of the situation, the Minister said in part:

"The plain facts do not support the statement that the armies are melting for lack of recruits and that recruiting has broken down.

"The Government has examined in detail the position of the Allies on the eastern front, and the results are not satisfactory. Excluding Russia and Roumania, the Allies have a substantial superiority in fighting and ration strength over the Central Powers. From a statistical standpoint the strength of the enemy

gives no cause for anxiety. "The withdrawal of Russia means that not less than 1,600,000 men will be made available on the western front. Notwithstanding Russia's defection, the resources of the Allies and America are sufficient to assure victory, and nothing but a psychological catastrophe can save the Central Powers.

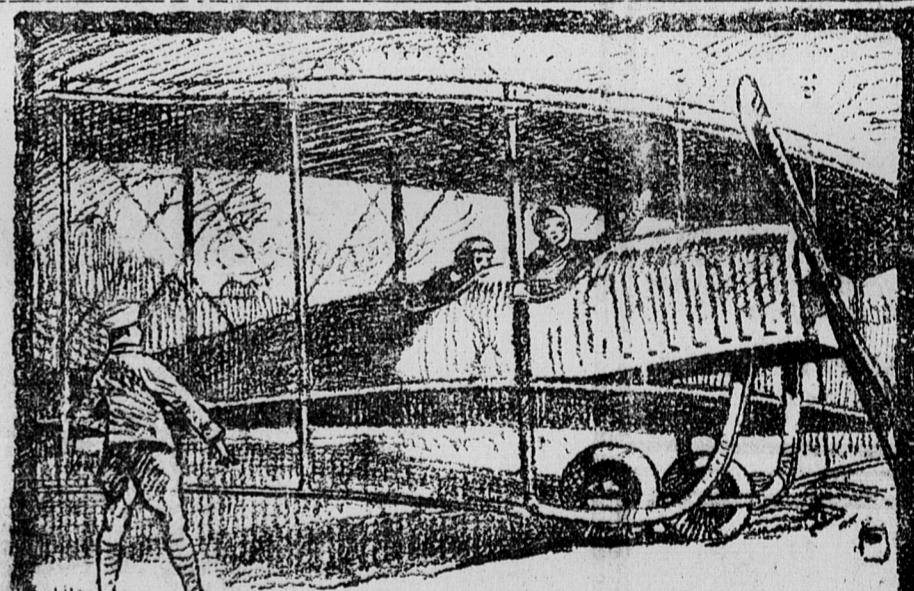
"Every day the hitting force of Britain becomes of great importance to the Alliance. Russia no longer strikes for freedom; France has poured forth her strength in the struggle and cannot sustain the full burden indefinitely. America is not yet in the field, and months must elapse before she can advance with full stride; Italy has suffered grave misfortune.

**Depends on Britain.**  
 "On Britain a d on the skill with which she handles her man-power in the months to come, everything depends.

"At sea we must be supreme; in the air we must win supremacy, and on land we must do the best we can to till the gap Russia has made until America can take her place. And all the time we have to keep our

vital industries going. "While the enemy possessed the advantage of an interior position, with a good railway system," continued the Minister, "they possessed the resources of public opinion, stability and solidarity of public opinion. Discussing the age question, he said that the Germans were using boys of eighteen on the Russian front and that Austria has raised the limit to 55 years. Analyzing the enemy's strength, he declared that the Germans would be able to withdraw 550,000 men from the eastern front, and the Austrians would be able to release enough to make the total 1,000,000."

Sir Auckland assures the House that the Entente Allies at the present time in numbers and morale were on equal terms with the forces of the enemy at present opposed to them, and with the necessary reinforcements, which would be found during the year, could face any additional forces which the enemy could bring. When the full force of America came into play, a superiority would be established, which would be the sure herald of complete and final victory.
