Among some souvenirs he sent home, are a match box and some rings, which he said he made to kill time during some long weary hours in the trenches, the former out of a German shell case and the latter out of aluminum of a German airplane. He also sent a little iron cross, which he filed from a piece of shrapnel, also German, and a copper arrow made from a driving band, from an over head shrapnel shell, which found its way to his trench. Mr. Mellick is one of our brave Islanders, who threw down his stripes and went to France to do real fighting, and although he has had no leave for some time, does not complain but cheerfully does his duty and writes cheering letters home.

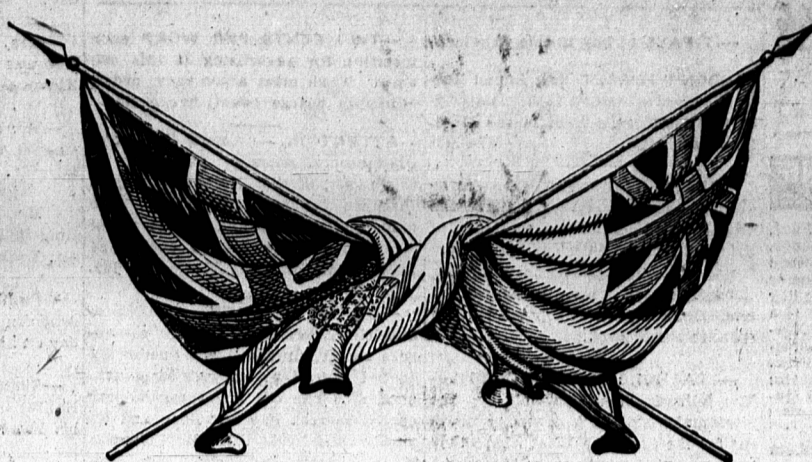
