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MR. PAGE ACCEPTS AMBASSADORSHIP

Takes Post Declined By Messrs Olney and Eliot.

WASHINGTON, April 4 (Special)—Walter Hines Page, of Garden City, L. I., editor of the World's Work, has been tendered and has accepted the post of Ambassador to London. Announcement of this was made at the White House.

The post already had been offered to Richard Olney and Charles W. Eliot, of Massachusetts, and declined by them both.

Mr. Page is a warm personal friend of the President, who is said to have offered him a post in his Cabinet, which he declined.

PRESIDENT NOUËL OUT OF OFFICE

Provincial Chief Executive of Dominican Republic Resigns.

SAN DOMINGO CITY, April 4 (Special)—Archbishop Nouël, at today's session of the National Congress, tendered his resignation as Provisional President of the Dominican Republic. The resignation was accepted and Congress will appoint his successor.

Ill health was given as the reason for Archbishop's Nouël's action, it being announced that he was obliged to go to Europe for medical treatment.

General Horacio Vasquez, General Juan I. Jimenes and Frederico Vasquez are candidates for the Presidency.

Quiet prevails throughout the country.

KING NICHOLAS MAY ABDICATE

Rumored Montenegrin Ruler May Give Throne to Son.

LONDON, April 4 (Special)—A Vienna despatch to the Daily Telegraph says a report is current that King Nicholas of Montenegro is about to abdicate in favor of Crown Prince Danilo. The recent rumors of the serious illness of King Nicholas arose from the fact that he suffered a fainting spell as a result of excessive smoking.

CHINESE ASSEMBLY LIST IS FILLED

Will All Members Elected—Question Prompt Recognition Before Wilson.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4 (Special)—The entire membership of both Houses of the first Chinese National Assembly under republican auspices has been elected, according to official advices. The first meeting will be held April 8 at Peking. There are about eight hundred members in the lower house and three hundred in the upper chamber. For the first meeting the members will exercise a double function, being practically delegates to a constitutional convention.

nized or whether the United States shall join other Powers in extending recognition only after the Chinese Assembly has met and acted upon the proposed constitution.

Chancellor Angrily Denounces Them—Denies Accusations.

LONDON, April 4 (Special)—Mr. Lloyd George's examination of the Marconi select committee of the House of Commons closed yesterday. He bitterly denounced any of his parliamentary colleagues who might have circulated slanders about him.

"If there is a debate," said the Chancellor of the Exchequer, "I shall ask these members to come forward." "There was an interesting discussion between Lord Robert Cecil and Mr. Lloyd George regarding whether the Chancellor's purchase of shares of the American Marconi Company was an investment for a speculation.

Mr. Lloyd George denied a speculation as a gamble and said he preferred to call the purchase an investment.

"I never have had much cash," he said, "and having a family I have always proceeded on the principle of not speculating."

He admitted on the stand that he made a profit of \$3,500 on the deal in American Marconi Company shares.

The Chancellor resented a remark of Mr. Faber.

"Do you mean to say I am not telling the truth," he demanded with emphasis.

Mr. Herbert Samuel, the Postmaster General, had begun his evidence when the committee adjourned until Tuesday. Mr. Samuel had just time to say that he had had no dealings in any Marconi concern, and he thought it would be highly improper for a Postmaster General to have an investment in any telegraph, telephone or similar concern.

Suffragettes caused a scene while Mr. Lloyd George was on the stand.

The Chancellor used the word "principle" and a male suffragist immediately rose and shouted an angry protest. He exclaimed, "I object to the man using the word 'principle.' He is a traitor. He has betrayed women."

The interrupter was promptly ejected, but another soon interposed.

Mr. Lloyd George had scarcely resumed giving his evidence when a suffragette cried out:—"You sold the women, all right."

Evidently there were many sympathizers in the audience, for shouts of "Hear! Hear!" resounded through the room.

Both the interrupter and her sympathizers were thrown out.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

LONDON, April 3 (Special)—The stubbornness of Montenegro in continuing the bombardment of Scutari, contrary to the wishes of the Powers, and the dilatoriness of Serbia in withdrawing her troops beyond the line decided upon as the frontier of the future Albania, will, if not overcome by more peaceful measures, lead to a demonstration and blockade of the Montenegrin coast and the ports of Albania occupied by Serbia.

Austria-Hungary is losing patience with her little neighbors and is urging the Powers to take action to enforce the demands contained in their notes to Serbia and Montenegro. When the naval measures are taken, it is expected that this duty will be allotted to Great Britain, Italy and Austria. Russia although she joined in the collective diplomatic action, will not participate in the coercive steps.

Serbia has expressed her intention of complying with the Powers' demand to evacuate Albania, but has made no movement in that direction, and the Austrian government complains, that instead of doing so, she is sending more war material to that territory, probably under the idea that she will not be forced to leave until peace has been concluded.

Austria, however, insists upon the immediate removal of the Serbians from the country, which, under the Powers' decision, cannot be Serbia's, no matter what the result of the fighting is.

The Powers have presented another note to the administration at Cetinje notifying Montenegro that Turkey has consented to the exodus of the civilian population from Scutari, and announcing that a representative of the Powers will take the news to Ismail Pasha the Turkish commander there. The Minister who received the note said that he would have to submit it to the Cabinet, but it is learned from an authoritative source that Montenegro will not agree to this.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., April 3 (Special)—That he swindled the Red Hook National Bank out of \$9,000 and got \$15,000 from a Boston broker just for the excitement and not because he was short of funds is the statement of Frederick Marks, who is under arrest in Boston, Mass., according to the police of that city. Marks, they allege, said he found it fascinating to pass forged drafts for large amounts and then read in the newspapers of the sensation his escapades had caused.

RECORD FLIGHT WITH PASSENGERS

Lieutenants of German Army Complete Non-Stop Flight.

PLZEN, Germany, April 4 (Special)—Lieutenants Canter and Boehner, of the German army, today completed a non-stop flight of 372 miles in an aeroplane, starting from Jutaberg and flying by way of Berlin and Lubeck to the vicinity of this city. The flight occupied six hours and nine minutes, making a world's record long distance flight with a passenger.

IMMENSE SMUGGLING SCHEME FOUND IN U. S.

NEW YORK, April 1—Officials in the office of the United States District Attorney says that one of the biggest plots in the history of the United States customs service has been uncovered as the result of statements made to them by two women.

Before the plot was discovered an assistant United States District Attorney said, goods valued at more than \$3,000,000 were smuggled into the United States. Some of the articles came by way of Boston, where, it is alleged, an official of that port and several customs inspectors were in league with the smugglers. Others were brought here from Canada by young women in the employ of the New York smugglers.
