JR. ABEGWEITS DEFEAT AMHERST SQUAD

Local Team Punch Home Five Goals In Final Session To Gain 4-goal Margin

Scoring five goals in the third period after being held on even terms in the first two sessions, Junior Absegweits last night defeated Amherst, St. Pats 10-6 in the opening game of a home and home, total-goal series to determine the squad that will oppose the Nova Scotia finalists in the semi-finals of the Maritime junior hockey playdowns.

With blazing speed predominating as the largest crowd of the season looked on St. Pats, starting out in defence of their title that they won for the last two seasons, gave the high-scoring "redshirts" a merry battle of it for forty minutes before willing before the speedy attacks of the Charlottetown forwards.

ST. PATS COME FROM BEHIND

Vic Marchant Leads Colts In 8-6 Win

Play Opens Fast

The first period opened fast with the Crystals having the edge of play but Oxford recovered their confidence so lacking in the first game. The Colts were content to play defensive hockey the first half of the frame as the Summerside forwards were unable to get a number of Crystals attacks at the goal mouth.
