CHAIRMAN MABEE IN IDEAL JUDGE.

OTTAWA, May 6-News of the death of Chairman Mabee, of the railway commission, was received with profound regret in administration circles. Earlier messages had encouraged the hope that Judge Mabee would recover.

It was with the deepest possible regret that I learned of Judge Mabee's death. His service to Canada as chairman of the board of railway commissioners was one of the highest value, and as he was still in the full prime and vigor of life, many years of usefulness lay before him, when this fatal illness intervened. He possessed exceptional qualifications for the position which he filled so ably and all who came before him recognized at once his courage, promptness, his fairness and his devotion to duty.

OTTAWA, May 6-Judge J. P. Mabee died at 3.15 o'clock, following two operations for acute appendicitis. The first operation was performed on April 30, and following it a bulletin was issued to the effect that the patient was doing well, altho a gangrenous condition of the appendix indicated that this operation was performed none too soon. On Thursday there occurred a relapse, with tremulous dissections, and a second operation was deemed necessary. Altho the operation was a simple one the patient's condition was such that but little hope could be held out for his recovery. He lingered on, however, until this afternoon when he passed away quietly.

Probably no public official in Canada has been more conspicuously successful than J. P. Mabee in gaining the confidence of the community since he was appointed to the chairmanship of the railway commission, the position which was first filled by A. G. Blair, the author of the legislation under which the transportation tribunal was appointed.

THA PAGE ESTATE CASE IN BRITISH COURT. LONDON, May 6-A romantic inheritance suit came up in the Probate Court, the property concerned being as Marshall Hall, K. C., who appeared for the claimant, said, in value almost beyond the dreams of avarice. It is worth between \$100,000,000 and \$150,000,000. Mr. Hall knows for certain.

The suit was concerned with what is known as the Page millions. Some 40,000 acres in the County of Middlesex were left by the will of Henry Page, who died in 1829. The executor of the will was Henry Young, who benefited. The present claimant is Mrs. Charlotte Anne Page, a descendant of Henry Page, who alleges that Henry Young exercised undue influence and seeks to have Page's will revoked as a preliminary step to proceedings for the recovery of the property which belonged to the Page family.

Mr. Hall admitted that it seemed impossible to establish a claim to the lands in question, and the judge declined to revoke a probate granted 80 years ago.

The Page estate extended to the Marble Arch, and comprised a great portion of Northwest London, which has grown an immensely valuable property in the last fifty years.

Owing to the problems of conveyance arising out of the unsatisfactory titles, to estates held by the Page family, which came into its possession after being confiscated from the Church, in the reign of Henry VIII., the administration of the estates presented considerable difficulties.

A railway company utilized a large track of the estate, and under an Act of Parliament, there being no title, the company paid the purchase

In 1906 it was reported that the Government had decided to declare the estate escheat to the Crown, but a law officer stated that the Treasury had again and again declined to take such action.
