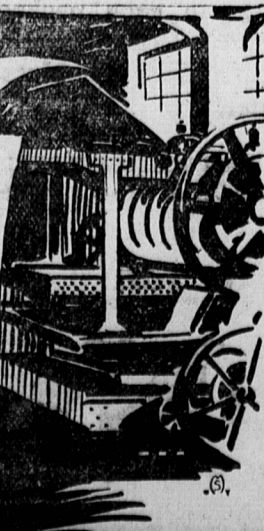

RECENT DISASTER IN JAPAN PROVED BOY SCOUTS' WORTH

TOKIO, Nov. 24.—Boy Scouts of Japan have come to the front wonderfully since the earthquake and fire. After working hard to house and feed children made homeless, they set themselves to providing spiritual needs, a work so necessary under the circumstances.

Education centers were established under the name "The field school for little children," and leaders of Boy Scouts from the schools and universities volunteered as teachers. Books, pencils and paper were supplied free. Physical examinations and medical treatment are given to the children and their spiritual as well as their physical wellbeing is vigorously cared for. The good spirit that has been engendered has resulted in an increased attendance daily.

This educational service will be continued until the school's can take care of the children. The movement, started in Tokio, is spreading to other districts.

MRS. LYDIA A LARGE

to meet their mother in a few hours, when the sad message reached them.

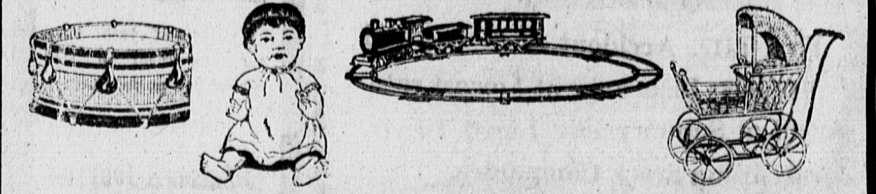
