ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

This special left last night for the Capes at the usual time.
THERE was no movement in the winter steamers at Georgetown yesterday.

THE Truckmen's Union held a large ball in Large's Rooms, corner Kent and Queen Streets last night.
THE adjourned Prohibition cases against Catherine McKenna and Mrs. Downing came up at the Police Court today.

The Zion Church, junior society of C. E. will meet this afternoon at 4.30 o'clock for re-organization. All the boys and girls who wish to join are asked to be present.

Dr. F. F. Kelly was sworn in as Mayor of Charlottetown yesterday afternoon before Mr. Justice Hodgson. The Councillors and Water Commissioners will be sworn in before the Mayor this afternoon at three.

A MISTAKE in the majority returns from Ward 5 was discovered yesterday when the City Clerk was revising the figures. The vote stood Horne 498, Kelly 409, instead of 798 and 700 as at first announced. This did not change Dr. Kelly's majority of 13 votes.

THE mail which had been taken Wednesday from Cape Traverse to Summerside because of the snow blockade on the branch railway line came to the city by the regular western train yesterday forenoon reaching here shortly after noon. There was crossing both ways at the Capes yesterday and the second mail reached the city at half past four.

At the Police Court yesterday John Bridges and William J. Bourke were before the Court for assault but as the prosecutrix declined to put in an appearance, the case was dismissed. William DeCoste, first appearance drunk and disorderly was dismissed. James McCarron for carrying firearms was fined \$5 or 30 days and Francis E. Higgins, drunk and disorderly was fined \$4 or 15 days.

THE marriage of Colin C. Ferguson, youngest son of Senator Ferguson, and now Actuary with the Canada Life Assurance Company at Toronto to Miss Edith Jean Clapp, of Toronto will take place at the residence of James R. Rie, Esq., Jarvis St., Toronto, on the 18th. inst.

AN unfortunate accident occurred a day or two ago to a woman of this city and serious and probably fatal results are feared. While working she had the misfortune to swallow a plate containing five teeth which were insecurely fitted in her mouth. A physician was summoned and did everything possible for the unfortunate woman but she is still in great danger.

THE mail brought to the City yesterday forenoon consisted of that which had arrived in Sackville on the afternoon of Friday last. The afternoon mails comprised the letters that had reached Sackville on Saturday, Monday and Tuesday. Citizens therefore received four days mails yesterday; and all that would arrive up to the present time by existing arrangements.
