### SUMMARY

**OTTAWA**, September 15. — The cattle market experienced a rather dull and drab session at all counts during the week and considerable ground was lost in a price way. The dullness in the trade at Toronto was apparent on both plain cattle and stock and prices on most grades were down 15c to 25c, although the offering was no heavier than during the previous week. In the West, receipts were fairly liberal and quality none too good. The result was a market that was rather disappointing to shippers especially after the previous week's fairly active trade. Prices throughout the West were anywhere from 25c to 50c lower with nearly all classes sharing in the decline. Several eastern orders for stock cattle remained unfilled at Winnipeg, the quality desired not being readily obtained.

**CATTLE PRICES**

While a top price of \$7 was paid for steers at Toronto, only one load was sold at that figure. Others were sold at \$6.50 downward. Good butcher steers and heifers opened with tops at \$6.25 but after Monday nothing went about \$6. Stockers were picked lots up to \$5.15 and \$5.25. At Montreal, the numbers and kinds of cattle offered took on the appearance of the usual heavy Fall runs, and plain to medium butchers were about 25c lower, with steers ranging up to \$7 but the bulk of the good ones between \$5 and \$6.50. Winnipeg closed with a fairly heavy carry-over, particularly of steers and cows. An odd choice steer was the week's top at \$6, but most of the good butcher steers were taken between \$5 and \$5.50. The market on steers at Calgary was very active but cows and heifers remained between \$5 and \$5.75, about equal to the previous week. Edmonton held fairly steady on all except active. Top butcher steers brought \$5 to \$5.75, about equal to the previous week. Good steers made between \$4.50 and \$5. Most grades of butchers closed 25c lower at \$5. Both Moose Jaw and Saskatoon closed definitely lower. Both these centres had tops in the steer division at \$5.25. Regins had nothing eligible in quality to make above \$4.25.

**United States Prices**

The Buffalo market was off 25c or more with grass cattle extremely slow. Some sales of Canadian steers were made between \$8 and \$9 with most loads going for \$8.50 up. A few Canadian calves were sold from \$12 downward. Regins good Canadian cows were \$6.60 and grass steers up to \$7.90.

Exports to the United States during the week consisted of 1,288 beef cattle, 384 dairy and 109 calves, making the totals to date this year 35,834 beef, 7,768 dairy, 37,322 calves, and 95 hogs, as compared with 148,148 beef, 9,220 dairy, 15,860 calves, and 55,832 hogs in the corresponding period a year ago.

**United Kingdom Prices Easier**

Trade on fat cattle was generally dull on British markets during the week, with prices easier and ranging from 40s.6d. to 42s.6d. for live hundredweight (112 lbs.). Store cattle sales were disappointing also as buyers in milk continue dear. The demand for these latter continues strong at good prices.

No Canadian cattle have left ports since Friday, September 9th. Exports to date this year amount to 26,177, compared with 8,547 in the corresponding period last year.

**Calf Market Uneven**

There was considerable variation as between one calf market and another. While Toronto was active and down 25c to 50c higher with choice veals up to \$10 and \$10.80, veals off about 25c and grassers 25c to 50c. The top on veals was \$9. Winnipeg, also, broke 50c to 75c and had good veals up to \$7.50 with odd tops at \$7.75. Calgary trade was up to a top of \$6 and Edmonton was steady up to \$6.50. Tops at Prince Albert were \$6. Moose Jaw \$6.50, Saskatoon \$7 and Regina \$7.50.

**Hogs Steady to Lower**

One or two hog markets held a level but with last week's levels about as a rule prices were considerably lower. Toronto opened slightly lower and lost further ground during the week to close with bacons at \$9.25 to \$9.40 off trucks and with buyers talking still lower prices for weekend deliveries. Montreal paid \$9.75 for hams, f. & w. and had odd sales up to \$10. Winnipeg market was uneven on a light bacons at \$9 off trucks and Edmonton was also fairly steady at \$9.90. Closing prices at Prince Albert were \$9, Moose Jaw and Regina \$9.10, and Saskatoon \$9.

**Lamb Market Lower**

Lambs dropped 25c to 50c at Toronto, good ewes and wethers making \$8 to \$8.25 with closing sales mostly at \$8. The bulk of the good lambs were sold at about \$8 at Montreal, while Winnipeg dropped 50c, top lambs closed at \$6.50. Top prices at Calgary and Edmonton were \$6.50. Prince Albert and Saskatoon \$6, and Moose Jaw and Regina \$6.50.

**CATTLE MARKETS**

TORONTO sold 6,321 cattle, including 1,000 westerners, mostly stockers. Trade was dull throughout on both killers and stores and prices down 15c to 25c on steers, heifers, and bologna bulls. Small butcher operators were fairly well represented but the larger abattoirs did not take their usual quota. Heavy steers were the slowest movers and several loads were unsold. The top for steers was paid on one load \$7, with others between \$5 and \$6.50. Good butcher steers and heifers opened at \$4.25 for tops and the bulk went at \$4.50 to \$5.75. Cows were steady at \$3 to \$4.50 and canners \$2.25 to \$2.50. Fed calves were unchanged between \$6 and \$9.50. Stockers were slightly easier at \$4 for common, up to

Although highways and waterways play important parts in moving to market Canada's agricultural production, the burden of handling this enormous traffic falls largely on the railways. Says an article in the current issue of the Canadian National Magazine, "In 1936, the Canadian National's rail way network handled over 7,000,000 tons of Canadian agricultural products valued at \$250,000,000 and sufficient to fill 245,000 freight cars. Strung out end to end, these cars would reach from Montreal to beyond Saskatoon, a distance of over 1,800 miles.

"The C.N.R. performs the biggest and most essential service of all the agencies which procure for Canadian agriculture the world-wide market it enjoys. Providing transportation to market for one of the principal products of the Canadian National, and so long as the C.N.R. continues to give this service, so long may Canadian farmers and ranchers continue to have the benefits of the widest possible markets for their products.

**CALF MARKETS**

TORONTO calves were active and 25c to 30c higher. Good to choice veals making \$9 to \$10, occasional tops \$10.50, and common heaves \$5. Grassers \$4 to \$4.75.

MONTREAL calves were unevenly lower. Veals were 25c down to \$6 to \$9 and grassers 25c to 50c lower between \$3.50 and \$5. Heaves were hard to sell.

**HOG MARKETS**

The Dominion hog run was 60,464, compared with 54,943 in the same week last year. Totals to date this year 2,170,622, last year 2,637,979.

TORONTO hogs dropped 35c to 50c, closing at \$9.25 to \$9.35. HAMILTON packers, prices opened at \$9.75 alive and \$12.60 to \$13.25 dressed and closed at \$9.25 and \$12.50 to \$12.85 for hams.

**SHEEP AND LAMB MARKETS**

TORONTO lambs lost 25c to 50c selling at \$8 to \$8.25 for good closing mostly at \$8. Bucks discounted \$1. Sheep steady at \$2 to \$4.50.

MONTREAL sold good lambs from \$7.75 to \$8 and discounted culls and bucks \$2 per hundredweight. Sheep made \$3.50 to \$4.50.

**Reports Fruit Crop Prospects Bright**

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—(CP)—A Dominion Bureau of Statistics fruit crop report today said preliminary estimate of Canada's 1938 apple crop was 5,029,400 barrels compared with the 1937 production of 5,140,000.

Estimates of other fruits with production figures for 1937 in brackets: Peas 458,000 bushels (446,200); Plums and Prunes 205,800 bushels (198,400); Cherries 188,000 bushels (153,000); Strawberries 8,484,000 quarts (8,600,000); Grapes 3,804,000 pounds (3,438,800).
