## HARRY CARBONELL DIED HERO'S DEATH.

The following letter has been received by Mr. E. T. Carbonell of this city. France, July 3rd, 1917. Dear Mr. Carbonell:—About a week ago, I received your letter of April 30th, 1917, and have made enquiries as to the death of your son. Your son was attached to "A" Company, of the Regiment for the 9th of April and went over the top with them. We met very stubborn resistance in La Folle Woods, and many casualties were caused here by sniping. Your son was hit by a sniper just in front of "Eco's" Company. I can say, Sir, that he did not suffer at all, but he met his end instantly. He is buried in front of Ecole Commune, just at the edge of La Folle Wood, along with three comrades of "A" Company. On last night I was passing those graves and I saw his grave. Sir, I can only offer my deepest sympathy to you and Mrs. Carbonell, and assure you that your son died a hero. I was in command of "A" Company at Vimy Ridge, and I know what we all went through. Again offering you my deepest sympathy, I remain, Respectfully yours, L. S. ALLAN, Ltut., Royal Canadian Regiment.

## UNITED STATES SPEEDING UP STEEL AND WOODEN SHIPS

WASHINGTON.—Ships will be built at once of both steel and wood, and there will be little talk about it. This was the decision of Chairman Hurley of the shipping Board and General Manager Capps of the emergency fleet corporation, as they settled into their new position today to take up the great marine construction work where it was stopped by the Goethals-Wenman row. Admiral Capps is going over the various ship building plans drawn to date. There will be shipbuilders. Both men promise action as soon as their nominations are confirmed by the Senate and they can officially take hold.

As to the number of steel and wood on ships to be built they are unable to say until they have studied the plans drawn to date. There will be more steel than wood vessels, however.

With this great work at last definitely under way the machinery for turning out aeroplanes was speeded up rapidly. Millions in contracts already have been let for the building of aircraft and with the \$640,000,000 available for early use, there will be no let up in construction and training of aviators.

The war department called for the mobilization of 100,000 additional National Guardsmen, who will train for service in France.

Congress battled with the food bill in its last stages. All departments were called up by Secretary McAdoo to draft estimates immediately of their expenses for the fiscal year. Bills must be raised by taxation and bonds.
