Provincial Meet Great Success

West Kent Won Interscholastic School Title At Abegweit Grounds Yesterday - Reg Prichard, S' Side, New Around Champion - 11 Records Go By The Boards.

(By Tec.) Prince Edward Island might well feel proud of its young athletes. Breaking eleven interscholastic records in an afternoon's field and track meet is just what a number of the boys accomplished in the annual Provincial Meet held at the Abegweit Grounds yesterday evening. Depression may be the word of the hour in other parts of the world, but from an athletic point of view, the Island doesn't know such a word. Upwards of two hundred and twenty-five well conditioned young thoroughbreds, representing a big portion of the lifeblood of the athletic citizenry and what have you, of the Garden Province toed the mark in the different events as worthy representatives of their respective schools and towns of the Province. Some were more fortunate than others in placing, but all cannot win, therefore, nothing but good-natured and sportsmanlike rivalry existed from start to finish. To West Kent School, the victors in the total aggregate of points—congratulations; to the separate winners and newly crowned champions—congratulations, and to Reg Prichard, speedy Summerside individual, who won the around medal—heartily congratulations—and to all others who played such an admirable part in the big meet—all hail. The weather was perfect in every sense of the word; the crowd was colorful and large and the competition close and exciting. What more could the athletic-minded desire. The officials who conducted the meet are to be commended for the capable manner in which the events were run off. Not a hitch marred the proceedings from the opening of the first event to the last. The two outstanding athletes of the day were, Reg Prichard, Summerside, and Kenneth Beer, Prince of Wales College. These young athletes were contestants in every event, and staged a close battle for total points, Prichard winning 22 and Beer 20. Spain's Leaders Plan Reforms On Wide Scale

(By William H. Laidler, United Press Staff Correspondent) MADRID, June 19-(U.P.)-The Spanish Republic has gone in for reforms on a profound basis, but has avoided the circus-like measures which featured the days of the general Dictator, the late General Primo de Rivera. When Primo de Rivera took hold of running the country-aided by a strict censorship of the press-he attempted to make sweeping reforms in the bureaucratic organizations in the capital. Government employees must all go to work daily and hence many, who for years had not gone to their offices at all, suddenly appeared and found no place to work, since there were not enough desks to go around both for those who habitually worked and those who did not work but drew salaries just the same. The Republic, although it easily could have done away with all the employees of its predecessor, has respected all those in the employ of the civil service who continue in their jobs just as if nothing had happened. And no strenuous orders have been issued to the employees, demanding a full day's work from them for example. One of the biggest changes to be effected by the overthrow of the monarchy will be in the field of education. Spain's illiterate population is approximately half its habitans. When Primo de Rivera came into power he quickly offered a solution. Since half could read and write, and the other half could not-why all that was necessary was for the half that did know how to teach the other half, and in a few months the country would be 100 per cent literate. And to set an example, he proposed himself to teach four persons how to read and write. For a few days four boys would come to his office for their lessons, but he soon found that this would not work. Now royal palaces in some places will become schools; new ones will be constructed in others; and many of the school houses which Primo built but left unprovided with teachers will now get teachers. The University City, started as a monument to ex-King Alfonso XIII, will be completed.

Continued from page 1 From a woman's hat she may be straightaway incarcerated and fined \$50. Visitors to the city who may be accustomed to wearing "hats or bonnets" in theatres are advised that that sort of thing is not done without a \$5 fine. If they insist they may wear skull caps, the code states. Theatre goers should not be deceived by a manager who gives his permission for hat wearing during the performance. His ignorance may cost him \$25. Kites may not be flown in the streets. Neither shall roller skaters travel there. It is unlawful to ride a bicycle on the sidewalk and still more serious to carry a friend on the handle bars. If you own a bakery, don't get caught sleeping in it, the code warns, and don't keep any animals besides a cat there. You should not smoke there and see to it that an adequate number of cuspidors are supplied. Files in "unreasonable numbers" are prohibited by city ordinance from entering a bake shop. Anyone having a penchant for horse meat must share the family dog's kennel ration, for butchers are prohibited from selling it in any other way. Truck gardeners are warned that the odor of cabbages emanating from a cabbage patch between October and April is a municipal offense. Hotel managers who fail to report the arrival of "itinerant merchants" are liable to a \$50 fine. Marriage may be promoted in Chicago but if the promoter accepts a fee for his efforts he may be fined in municipal court.
