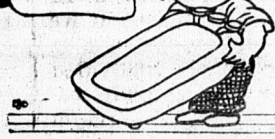

GOVERNMENT VESSELS IN PORT.—Hopper Barge No. 1 and the steamer Berthier of the Canadian Naval Service, arrived in Charlottetown on Tuesday night. Both vessels are on their way from Halifax to Sorel and called at Charlottetown for coal.

Hopper Barge No. 1 is a vessel which has been employed in supplying water to the warships and transports at Halifax. She has capacity for carrying 200 tons of fresh water. The vessel was formerly in the service of the Public Works Department and is now being returned to that department. She is in command of Capt. Burke of Charlottetown. The Berthier, commanded by Captain Read has been engaged in the examining service in Halifax harbor. She is now being returned to the Marine Department. The former vessel is being captained by C. Lyons & Co. and the latter by Buntin Bell & Co. They expect to sail on Friday morning.

3,300 MILES FLIGHT  
A squadron of Alcoa de Havilland-4 aeroplanes has returned to Washington after a 3,300-mile flight to the Gulf of Mexico and Pacific Ocean. The actual flying time for the 3,300 miles was 1,940 minutes an average speed of 101 miles an hour. In the trip they crossed the mountain "backbone" of the continent at a height of 16,000 feet, and dipped into the famous Grand Canyon of the Colorado River to a distance of 600 feet below the rim. Their was the first flight ever attempted across the Grand Canyon.
