The Guardian has received a copy of the third edition of a little volume of 112 pages entitled G. Company, or Every-day Life of the R. C. R. The writer was the late Russell C. Hubley, son of Rev. A. M. Hubley of Sussex, N. B. He went out with the first contingent which sailed from Quebec in November 1859. After ten or eleven months of hard work in Africa he was invalided home and subsequently died. The greatly beloved young soldier was accorded a military funeral with two thousand men in the procession. The book is a descriptive account of typical events in the life of the first contingent in South Africa. It is an unassuming narrative, simply yet attractively written and abounding in patriotic touches. It has touched the popular heart as few other stories of the war have done. That a third edition should have been called for affords evidence of its popularity. A portrait of the author and a brief memoir by his father add to the interest and value.

A Guardian correspondent attending the Y. M. C. A. Conference, being held at Trenton, N. Y., writes, under date of Dec. 7: One of the most important Y. M. C. A. Conferences ever held for the consideration of Association Work for young men in non-Christian lands met in this city on Dec. 7 and adjourned this evening. So important was the Conference that the Assembly Hall of the State House was granted for the meeting house. The Conference was under the guidance of John R. Mott of New York, the Secretary of the World's Student Federation, and head of the secretaries and leaders of prominent A. S. C. A. associations in Canada and the Eastern States were present. Already the Y. M. C. A. movement of North America has 31 Secretaries in the large cities scattered over India, Japan, China and Mexico. According to the policy outlined for the next five years, 35 additional Secretaries must be sent out and 45 new buildings erected. Immediately after the Conference here there will be a celebration of the 25th anniversary of the Intercollegiate Y. M. C. A. Movement of Canada and the States to be held in Princeton University, Princeton, N. J.
