DID PENNELL KILL BURDICK

Incriminating Letter From Him to Mrs. Burdick

Is Found—"I Feel it My Duty to Kill Ed. Burdick"—Pennell Probably Suicided—An Accomplice in the Crime.

BUFALO, N. Y., March 18, 1903.—Sensational in the extreme is the newest bit of evidence unearthed by the authorities to connect Arthur R. Pennell with the murder of Edwin L. Burdick.

It is a letter written by Pennell to Mrs. Burdick, and containing in substance the words: "I feel it my duty to kill Ed. Burdick."

The letter was found by detectives who searched the Burdick house on the morning of the discovery of the tragedy, and has since been kept securely locked in the vault in the district attorney's office.

Mr. Coatsworth, when seen late tonight, would not discuss the missive further than to say that he had in his possession a letter which would probably be read at the conclusion of the inquest on Monday. There was no mention of the inquest today.

Many letters passed between Pennell and Mrs. Burdick, and not a few of them treated almost exclusively of the rupture in the Burdick household caused by the intrusion of Pennell. Two or three were found when the officers ransacked drawers and desks on the morning of Feb. 26, but only one of them was thought significant.

This letter was written by Pennell about three months ago, and rehearsed the romance which had been engaged in by Burdick and Pennell; the persistent refusal of Burdick to discontinue the divorce suit; the necessity of a discontinuance of the proceedings, and contained the phrase quoted in substance above.

The murderous feelings of the man whom Burdick had named as correspondent were vividly expressed, the authorities say, and there can be no doubt in the minds of those who read the letter that the utterances were made by a man who was expressing grim determination, and not idle reflections.

All efforts to have Mrs. Burdick discuss the letter to-night failed. It is thought to be the intention of the authorities to read the sensational letter in court, and ask Mrs. Burdick if she ever received it, to ask her, further, if from it she implied that Pennell really intended to kill her husband.

The reading of the missive, and the subsequent questioning of Mrs. Burdick, will, unless prospects change, be the real climax of the inquest. Although Mrs. Burdick has sent no word to the authorities, it is understood, now that Pennell is dead, that she will tell all she knows of his squabbles with Mr. Burdick, of his letters to her, his conversation with her, his threats—if, in truth, he ever made any—and, in brief everything she knows which might throw light on the crime.

No one was in a position to know so well as she just what degree of hatred Pennell fostered for Mr. Burdick; no one can venture a truer opinion than she as to whether Arthur R. Pennell was instrumental in causing the death of her husband. She was present on several occasions when the two men had wordy battles; she talked to both of every phase of the troubles.

For several days it has been the subject of comment that there is a growing tendency among persons intimately associated with the family to throw suspicion exclusively upon Arthur R. Pennell, and in the light of developments of the last few days the authorities are gradually coming around to the theory that, after all, he murdered Mr. Burdick, or caused him to be murdered, and committed suicide.

But, as expressed tonight by a high official, to shift responsibility for the murder upon Pennell by no means clears up the mystery, for, the official declared, he certainly had an accomplice. Prominent persons who a few days ago defended the young lawyer with positiveness now assert that they are convinced he knew something about the crime; that he went to Niagara Falls the following day for the purpose of committing suicide and taking his wife over the falls with him in case he learned that the authorities were on his heels; that he practically confessed by his mental and physical collapse that he was guilty, and that he rode liberally into the quarry with his wife. His supporters are dwindling in number each day.

Singularly enough the police authorities are the last to adopt the theory which has him for its foremost figure. His effects have been thoroughly searched and not an incriminating document found. The authorities did not conduct the search, but had an understanding with the persons who did make it that anything of an incriminating nature would be surrendered to them.

The statement has been made that he went to the Falls partly for the purpose of casting the weapon of death where it could never be found, and that when he attended to his own furnace on the morning of the murder he destroyed clothing or other things which had left traces. A new line of reasoning has been brought out to show beyond a doubt that Pennell actually steered his automobile

into the quarry. Had the machine been beyond his control, they declare, the wheels would have passed up on the curb almost at right angles and pursued a course almost at right angles with the curb. This they explain by saying that, after the left front wheel struck the stone, the right front wheel, the axle being free, would have quickly swung around to the curb, and that both would have leaped over the coping simultaneously.

But, they argue, if the steering lever were held firmly, the course of the vehicle in striking the curb would have changed but little, if any, and that both wheels would have passed over the stone ledge at an oblique angle and pursued an oblique course. That is precisely what the Pennell automobile did.

The adjournment of the inquest till next Monday was said to have been done because of the failure of Mr. Coatsworth's voice. It is generally understood, however, that the adjournment was taken so that the authorities could follow clues which have developed during the progress of the inquiry. There are but few more witnesses to be examined—Mrs. Burdick, Alfred Brook, the furnace man who declares he heard the voice of Mrs. Hull in the Burdick cellar on the morning of the discovery of the murder; the furnace man who found Mr. Pennell in his cellar on the same morning, and a few police officers.

It is possible that Mrs. Hull will be recalled and that Miss Marian Burdick, the dramatic witness at Monday's session, will be asked to rehearse the scenes in her home on the morning she learned that her father was dead.

GET LOWER INSURANCE.

LONDON, March 20.—It is announced here to-day that the Canadian Pacific Company have insured the Beaver line of steamers they recently purchased in London at the rate of four guineas, against the rate of seven guineas paid last year. The hazardous nature of navigation on the St. Lawrence, it has always been held, made such a low rate as four guineas impracticable. The Beaver ships for eighty-four shillings per hundred pounds are insured against all risks. This is at an average of 500 pounds for 15 day return trips. Premiums are payable quarterly.
