He was stunned by the fall, and his side severely bruised and his ear cut. He is however able to drive home and is again able to attend to business.

SUMMER-IDE had its first acetylene gas lighting last evening. A plant just put in by Mr. L. Morris in his store and office was started with five lights, and the result was viewed by hundreds of interested passers by. It is a beautiful steady white light of intense brilliancy, easy to read by and not in any way trying to the sight. The comments on it by those who saw it were most favorable and Mr. Morris feels proud of his trial result.

THE barns and out buildings of Mr. Stutler Yeo, Travelers Rest, were burned to the ground yesterday morning with nearly all their contents including the season's crop. ### Reciprocity With Canada.

A memorial of the Merchants' Exchange of Buffalo, addressed to the United States Commissioners at the International Conference in Quebec, says:

The attention of the United States is turned to this conference largely because of the hope that from it will come a satisfactory agreement leading to a great expansion of trade between Canada and the United States. Without such agreement, the result of the conference will be a deep disappointment.

The manufacturers and producers of New England have, through the Boston Chamber of Commerce, already expressed their views on this question. We venture to think that the Buffalo Merchants' Exchange voices here the views and wishes of the manufacturers and producers of the Central West, of the region north of the Ohio River, and lying between Pittsburg and Buffalo, on the east, and Chicago and Milwaukee on the west.

This part of the country has now become the centre of the manufacture of iron and steel in the United States, and the most important seat of the many kindred industries which are dependent upon cheap iron and steel as raw material. It is but a few years since these manufacturers were content to hold the home market for their products. All this has been changed, and from a variety of causes has come about a condition by which iron and steel and other products into which iron and steel largely enter are being produced in this region.

In spite of the tariff obstructions which have been raised on both sides to the trade between Canada and the United States, the Dominion is now in proportion to its population the best customer of the United States. The people of Canada are like us in their requirements and their tastes. Their necessities are increased by the rigorous climate in which they live. Their consuming and purchasing powers are many times greater than those of people living in a mild or tropical climate under easier conditions. It is not too much to say that Canada, by reason of her proximity to our factories and the character of her population, presents to American producers a market of more importance and magnitude than a nation of 50,000,000 people living in a distant land with habits and requirements dissimilar to those of our own people.

It is not our purpose to enter into an analysis of the condition of trade between Canada and the United States or to speak in behalf of any particular trade or interest. It is enough for us to point out that, if the opportunity were given, the manufacturer of the Central West could take and hold on equal terms against all comers the Canadian market for his products.

Of course we are aware that for these privileges in Canadian markets we must expect to grant reciprocal privileges in our markets to Canada. We are not unmindful of the difficulties which will be met along this line. It is probable that the reciprocal privileges which Canada will seek will consist for the most part of an entrance into our markets for natural products—products of the farm, the mine and the forest. Special interests in the United States will protest vigorously. To such protests, however, we may oppose the consideration that there are business interests of great importance in the United States which will be generally benefited by the free admission of some Canadian natural products; also that an arrangement by which the United States gives a limited market to Canadian natural products and raw materials, and secures in return a market for American manufactured goods, may be advantageous to Canadians, but would be even more advantageous to the United States.

The great central fact however, which we desire to impress upon the High Commissioners of the United States is that the desire of the people of this country for a much freer interchange of products with Canada, and for the successful negotiation of a reciprocal treaty on comprehensive lines, we respectfully urge that the opposition of special interests shall not be permitted to stand in the way of this result.

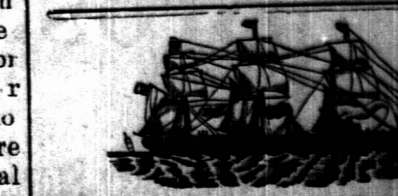
