—ARMY FIELD SERVICE FUND.—On Tuesday September 15th, at the call of the Rev. Pastor of Mount Carmel, over four hundred persons were present to take part in one of the most patriotic meetings ever held in this province. The Rev. P. P. Arsenault having been appointed chairman, explained in a few chosen words the object of the meeting. Mr. D. D. Arsenault, Principal of Mount Carmel School acting as secretary. On the stage besides the gentlemen above mentioned, were seated the Hon. A. E. Arsenault, Hon. Mr. Dobie, Mr. Mathew Gallant, who for twenty-five and more years has been engaged as a member of the teaching staff of this province. Mr. Adrien Arsenault, B. A., student-at-law with Mr. A. C. Saunders, Summerside. The chairman's remarks were followed by the spontaneous gift of the ladies towards the Red Cross Society, consisting of one hundred and twenty-five pairs of stockings, and eighty-five pairs of wristlets together with pillow slips and sheets and other articles. Mr. A. E. Arsenault followed and explained the causes and effects of the present war, and dwelt upon the necessity of everyone contributing his part towards the maintenance of the army. Mr. Dobie expressed his great pleasure at seeing such a large and enthusiastic assembly and dwelt upon the generous gifts of the ladies present. Mr. Gallant reviewed the causes and effects of the Napoleonic wars and foreshadowed as great a defeat to the Kaiser's armies as Napoleon had met on the field at Waterloo. Mr. Adrien Arsenault in very classical French showed how the Academics have always been loyal and truthful to the British Crown and emphasized the necessity of contributing part of material goods, yea! more of their blood if necessary. Mr. Arsenault, the next speaker, under the spell of such patriotic discourses, said he was not equal to the occasion, however, on such a grand and momentous circumstance he could not but express his pleasure at being present and declared that if all the ladies of the Empire are as generous as those of Mont Carmel, the forsaken soldier will find comfort in his abandonment. About one thousand bushels of oats were sub-

scribed. The martial and soul inspiring hymn, "O Canada, Terre de nos Aïeux," was rendered with enthusiasm and never was "God Save the King" sung in a more prayerful tone of appreciation.

—SANG "RULE BRITANNIA"
 LONDON, Sept. 21.—A Times correspondent in France describes an incident at Havre where the United States cruiser Tennessee lay in the harbor and a British transport, the decks of which were thronged with soldiers, passed her. The American cruiser dipped the Stars and Stripes and suddenly the British Tommies broke into "Rule Britannia."

—SUCCESSFUL RUSSIANS PURSUIT
 LONDON, Sept. 21.—A despatch from Petrograd says the Russians are pursuing the Austrians along the River San and have captured Durbecko, 75 miles west of Lemburg, and have crossed the river despite an attempt made by the Austrians to prevent them.

—Then," says the correspondent, "an amazing thing happened. I heard and was thrilled by it. The bronzed American sailors took up the rolling chorus: "Rule Britannia, Britannia rules the waves. Britons never, never, never shall be slaves." "It was the most brotherly act I have ever witnessed."
