fact, to apply only a light even coating of spray where possible. Though this procedure can be followed in many parts of the country, however, it is difficult for some regions. In some of the fruit growing sections a fine mist spray can be rarely used. Frequently the winds are strong enough to necessitate a coarse spray in order that the tree may be sprayed thoroughly. In such cases no choice remains; a coarse spray must necessarily be applied. Drenching, however, may be avoided by using care and judgment.

In cases of lime-sulphur injury induced by previous fungus infection, there is no question as to the proper procedure. It is much more advisable to destroy the leaves by means of the spray than to allow the fungus to become destructive.

The most simple method that presents itself of avoiding lime-sulphur injury is to weaken the soluble sulphides by increased dilution. From our own experiences and those of several others we are led to believe that lime-sulphur properly made (i.e., boiled for not more than one hour) is not injurious at the strengths generally recommended. Home-boiled preparations are rarely injurious for this reason. On the other hand, we know of lime-sulphur factories that prolong boiling for three or four hours. This gives a concentrate that is more injurious (on account of the greater proportion of sulphides in solution) than a properly made concentrate. It is rather difficult to remedy.
