**REED CHEMISTRY GRADUATE DETAILS**

The following from a Portland, Oregon, exchange will be read with interest by relatives and friends as Dr. Livermore's mother was the former Miss Helena Smith, sister of the late Mr. William Smith of this city. She was for some time in the millinery department of Moore's and McLeod's and is pleasantly remembered.

Dr. Arthur Livermore, who for the last two years has been working in chemistry at the University of the American laboratories which collaborated on penicillin research for army-navy program, Wednesday returned to Reed College, where he did his undergraduate study in chemistry, to discuss the work with scientists here.

"Up to this time," said Dr. Livermore, "the only penicillin in medical use is borrowed from natural molds. Great strides have been made during the period of war research, however, in studying the structure and synthesis of the drug. The results of research done by these 40 war laboratories is being compiled and will be published in book form early next year."

Working under Dr. V. du Vigneaud, one of the nation's leading bio-chemists, he was one of a team of 15 scientists engaged by the government for the Cornell University chemical research project.

Dr. Livermore is now an instructor and engaged in research at Cornell University Medical College, New York City, and was named in a recent United Press story announcing discovery of the synthetic process.

Mr. Trainor is survived by his wife, Josephine of Calgary, a daughter, Mrs. John D. McIlhargey, Calgary, a nephew, Leo Trainor, Calgary, two brothers, Frank, Calgary and Ernest, Detroit, Michigan; two sisters, Sister St. Francis of Assisi, Congregation of Notre Dame, Providence, R. I., and Mrs. Martin Gallivan of Calgary, and two grandsons, Michael and Terence McIlhargey, Calgary.

A solemn Requiem High Mass was sung in St. Mary's Cathedral, Calgary, at 9 a.m., Friday, Dec. 6, 1946, and burial followed in St. Mary's cemetery. Pall bearers were Messrs. P. Coyle, O. Condon, H. J. Ryan, J. Zarotti, P. L. Hughes and R.G. Faherty, R. I. P.

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**Translucent Shields**

Add to new home guards, translucent plastic mesh window shields which admit as much light as plain glass, but screen windows from inquisitive eyes. When the spring-roller-operated shields are pulled down, light rays, filtering through vitilite mesh, are spread in a diffused glow through the room. Treated to an occasional damp cloth cleaning, these shields will retain their frosty beauty for years, say the makers.

New locks streamlined for greater beauty and easier operation have super pin-tumbler cylinders that defy the ordinary lock-picking thief. One such lock is a sleek-looking, rustless metal "one-arm" night latch. This doubles its bid for favour from package-encumbered housewives because it can be opened with one hand, leaving the other hand free to manipulate bundles or baby. The latch bolt, automatically held back when the key is turned in the lock, springs out and locks the door as it closes.

Other newcomers—ready for personal locks that secure any door against a meddlesome Miss Fry. A metal shaft that fits between door and door jamb. It is long enough to accommodate various door thicknesses.

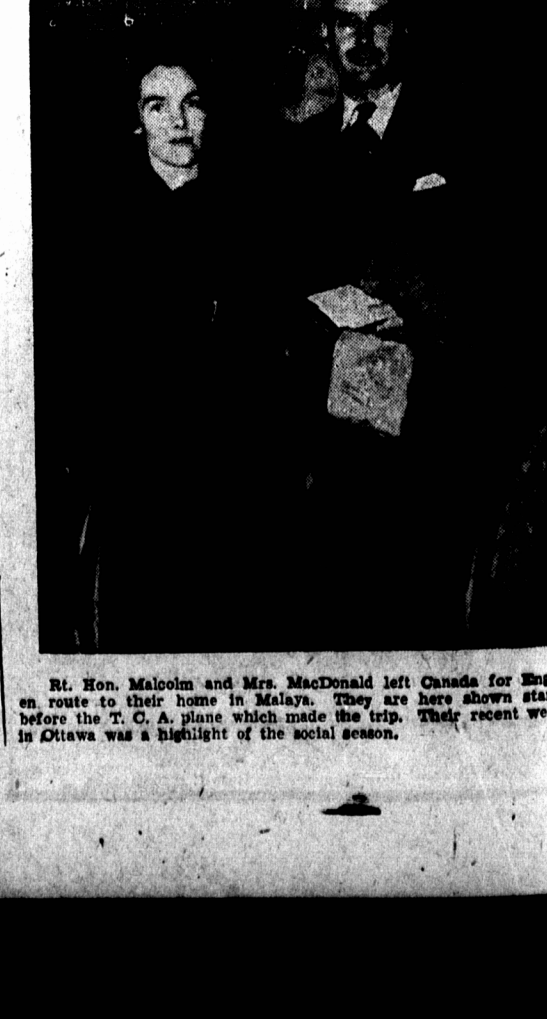
Another lock made of white plastic and designed to be attached to bathroom doors, can be broken by a stout blow on the door should Junior lock himself in.
