AGUINALDO INSTRUCTS

Plans for the Capture of
the City of Manila.

MASSACRE AMERICANS

Instructions Given to Women
to Throw Boiling Oil and
Water on Americans.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—The war depart-
ment to-day made public the following
letter of instructions for the capture of
Manila, purporting to be signed by Agu-
inaldo, with the explanation that it was
with the records captured by the Amer-
ican forces. The letter is dated Malolos,
9th of January, 1899, and is headed:
"Instructions to the brave soldiers of
Sandatana of Manila."

It opens with an exhortation to all Fili-
pinos to secure converts among their
fellow countrymen. Being assured of the
sincerity of the convert he was to be in-
structed to preserve the character of the
American sympathizer in order that he
might furnish news of importance to the
Filipinos. The letter details the method
of attack and surprise of American forces,
advising and a semblance of friendship
until entrance to the city has been effected
by the slaughter of sentinels. The attack,
the letter goes on to say, should be led by
men dressed as women. The officers are
advised to place, stones, timbers, red-hot
iron, boiling water, oil, molasses, and rags
soaked in coal oil, along the walls, to
throw at the Americans passing below.
The sympathizers inside the city are
urged to be ready to assist whenever
there is evidence of movement in the streets.

"With such a general movement, firm
and decided against the Americans," the
letter goes on, "the combat is sure to be
a short one and I charge and order that
the persons and goods of all foreigners
shall be respected and that the American
prisoners shall be treated well. These
shall be in houses vessels filled with boil-
ing water, tallow, molasses, and other
liquids, which shall be thrown as bombs
on the Americans who pass in front of
their houses, or they can make use of
syringes or tubes of bamboo. In these
houses shall be the Sandatana who shall
hurl the liquids that shall be passed to
them by the women and children.

"In places of bolts or dagges, if they
possess the same, the Sandatana can pro-
vide themselves with lances and arrows
with very long sharp heads, and these
should be shot with great force in order
that they may penetrate well into the
bodies of the enemy. And those should
be made that in withdrawal from the body
the head will remain in the flesh.

"At last if, as I expect, the result shall
favor us in the taking of Manila and the
conquering of the enemy, the chiefs are
charged to see that the officers and soldiers
respect the consulates, the banks and
commercial houses and even the Span-
ish banks and commercial houses, taking
care that they be not injured by the hope
of plunder. As if God sees this he will re-
ward us and the foreign nations will re-
spect the order and joy of our conduct. I charge,
that in the moment of combat the officers,
soldiers and whatever patriots take part
in the struggle will not forget our noble,
sacred and holy idea, liberty and independ-
ence. Neither will you forget the prom-
ises made by me to the civilized nations
whom I have assured that we Filipinos
are not savages, nor thieves nor assassins,
nor are we cruel, but on the contrary,
that we are men of culture and patriotism
honorable and very humane.

"Above all, I expect that you will re-
spect the persons and goods of private per-
sons of all nationalities, including the
Chinese; that you will treat well the
prisoners and grant life to those of the
enemy who surrender. And that, you will
be on the lookout for those traitors and
enemies who by robbery will seek to
mar our victory."
