ROOSEVELT'S AFRICAN TRIP.

WASHINGTON, October 5.—The army of rough riders, who have been looking forward to the President's African trip in quest of big game as an occasion in which they would play a part, will be disappointed. The President has no intention of having anybody accompany him on the trip except his son Kermit. Two taxidermists from the National Museum will go along, but will not be invited directly. The National Museum will be asked to detail them from the official staff. The President has already notified the officers of the museum that he will send back such of the specimens as the museum may want to preserve. No definite itinerary has yet been arranged. The President will go where he can find game, and if he fails to find it in one place he will go to another, and when he has found it he will camp there. The details of the trip will not be made, therefore until after he has consulted his guides who will not be from the United States. The caravan will be mustered in the African coast. Reports that the President has accepted an invitation from the Sultan of Zanzibar to visit that official or dignitary are also premature. The President has received no invitations and his plans at present will hardly admit of his accepting any. A story called "The President's Trip to Zanzibar" was planned to entertain the President is classed as romance today. It is not likely, it was said that the President would be within one thousand miles of Zanzibar.

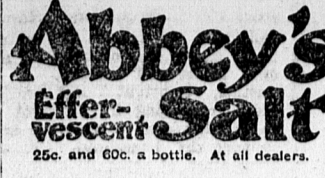

POPE TREATS TO CIGARS.

ROME, Oct. 5.—The members of the National Gymnasium society of Montreal, Canada, together with H. T. Scott, instructor of the Society, were received in special audience by the Pope Wednesday morning. Cardinal Merry del Val, the papal secretary of state, acted as interpreter. The holy father cordially congratulated the Canadians on the prizes they were taking home. He sent a special message of love and his benediction to the French Catholics of Canada, and at the close of the interview he presented the Canadian gymnasts with two large boxes of very fine Havana cigars.

RUSSIAN ADMIRAL HISTORY OF WAR.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 5.—Following the example of General Kuropatkin, who wrote a history of the land campaigns of the late war between Russia and Japan, Admiral Nebogatov, who commanded a squadron of Admiral Rojestvensky's fleet at the time it was defeated by the Japanese, Admiral Togo is writing a naval history of the war. The first volumes dealing with events to the decisive battle of Tsushima Straits has been completed.

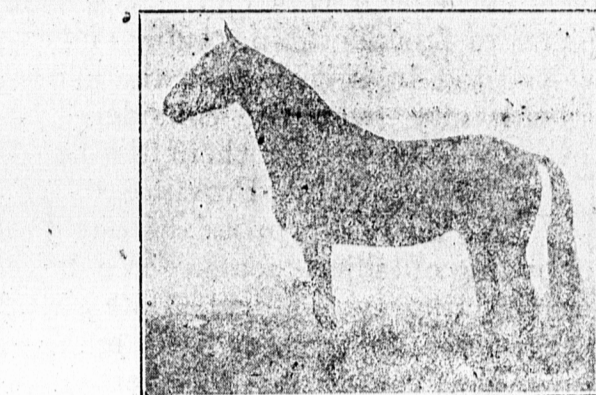
