the recent grant from the Carnegie Foundation to the Provincial Government. Miss Bateson explained that the Summerside centre would serve the surrounding country districts. In establishing these libraries the Carnegie Foundation assisted the community with the expenses, usually on a fifty-fifty basis, with the idea that in three years time the library would be self-supporting. The only expense to the public was the rent, lighting, etc. of the room to house the books and a small salary for a custodian. The books were supplied absolutely free. The books were catalogued at the head office in Charlottetown. Books on any industry; also books on cooperative marketing would be included in the list of books; as well as the best literature. French books would be available for the French population. Miss Bateson pointed out that the conditions on which the grants are made is that the Library must be absolutely free to the public. She congratulated the I. O. D. E. on their splendid library and suggested that they approach the Town Council with a view to getting a little more assistance from them so that they could withdraw the small fee now charged by the I. O. D. E. in order that the conditions of the Carnegie Library could be complied with. It should be considered a magnificent gift for any town to receive, and she thought that the better plan was for the Town Council to take over the library with the assistance of the I. O. D. E., who had already accomplished such a splendid service in supplying reading matter to the public. A supply of 5,000 books would be available as soon as the necessary arrangements were completed. The matter was postponed and a committee formed with Miss Hunt as chairman to complete the necessary details.—S.

Exports Good In Winnipeg Grain Exchange

WINNIPEG, Sept. 5.—The week-end accumulation of selling orders in the form of hedges from elevator interests, proved too much for the buying power on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today and prices at the close were 1/2 to 3/4 cent lower.

Export business during the day was good and this, with over-the-week-end sales was estimated at more than 3,000,000 bushels. Deliveries from farms during the week-end, however, with the market closed for two days, resulted in a deluge of hedging orders today which out-balanced export buying and sent prices below Friday's finish.

"Duet" Fog Horn Still Under Test

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Sept. 5.—Saint John's "duet" or two-tone fog horn which was recently installed on Partridge Island as an experiment is evidently not working out in respect of the second note which has been classified as an echoing wheeze as compared with the loud roar of the dominate note. However, tests are continuing and an official report has not yet been made. The new fog horn replaced the previous one-toned horn six months ago. The old horn caused many a bull moose heart to beat faster when it sounded. It's note was similar to the call of the cow moose and citizens of Saint John were at times treated to the spectacle of bull moose being "called" by the sound of the horn. Hunters, particularly, regretted the passing of the old horn. Captains of vessels frequenting the port, including those of Canadian National steamships, were asked to make report on the effectiveness of the new fog horn. Saint John has the distinction of installing the first steam fog horn in the world in 1839 and its location was on Partridge Island where there is also a powerful light-house. Provision for the first light-house on this island was made in 1788.
