HERE FROM VENEZUELA - Thursday evening from Toronto, among the passengers by the last train last evening was Mrs. M. W. of the Newell of Maracabo, Venezuela, Presbyterian Church in Canada. He who is visiting her brother and sister very largely attended and that great enthusiasm prevailed. The election of Rev. W. G. Brown, as Moderator met with general satisfaction. He made an ideal presiding officer. The past year has been one of quiet unalloyed growth. This is especially true of the work among the young people. The number of S. School scholars showed an increase of 13,000. The contributions to the Budget were considerably in excess of those of 1930. There was much to give encouragement to all Presbyterians from ocean to ocean. As an Assembly, the meeting of 1931 will go down as one of the best in the history of the church. Some of the older men in attendance had no hesitation in saying that it was the best that they had ever attended. Quite a number of knotty problems came up for discussion. Several of the debates were lively, but all were carried on in a spirit of good will. The Moderator, Rev. W. G. Brown, in summing up all of the various features of this Assembly, gave a very timely address and in closing made a strong appeal to all present to go out determined to do a greater work in the incoming year in bringing in the Master's Kingdom than they had ever done in the past. As their leader, he was ready to lay himself on the altar and to go anywhere that the Master would have him go to help bring this great Dominion to be His Kingdom. During the term of office, Mr. Brown will visit the Maritime Provinces. It is possible that he will attend the meeting of the Maritime Synod, which is to be held in St. Andrew's Church, Pictou, in October. Tragic Fatality At Sackville

One Dead, Two Seriously Injured When Car Collided With Express From P. E. Island.

MONCTON, June 19.—Miss Mamie LeBlanc, of Legers Corner, is dead, W. Bruce Logan of Moncton was seriously hurt and two other members of a Moncton party were more or less seriously injured when the motor car in which they were driving collided with the noon day express from Prince Edward Island at Sackville on Thursday. The occupants of the car were Miss LeBlanc, Miss Pansy Weatherby, an employee of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, W. Bruce Logan, 25 Cornhill street, a taxi driver, and Gordon Cummings, a clerk in the general offices of the Canadian National railway, who resides in Dominion street. Bruce Logan is in the Highland View hospital at Amherst suffering from serious head wounds and a badly injured arm. Miss Weatherby and Gordon Cummings were brought to this city on the train from Sackville at two o'clock but are not thought to be seriously injured. Miss Weatherby was taken to the hospital for an examination. Dr. W. F. Kirby was called to the train on its arrival and said that a superficial examination did not disclose any serious injuries, although a fracture of the right arm might exist. Miss LeBlanc was rushed to the Amherst hospital, but was dead when the ambulance got there.

Did Not See Train The accident occurred when the motor car in which the party was driving, returning from Amherst, was descending the hill at the Bridge street crossing of the railway in Sackville. According to Cummings, none of the party noticed the approach of the train until it was too late. Logan, who was driving, applied the emergency brake as soon as the train was seen but too late to avoid a collision. In an effort to avoid it he turned the car down the track but collided with the engine of the train, which struck the car and overturned it, carrying it along the roadway for some distance and practically wrecking it. Miss LeBlanc and Logan were in the front seat of the car and Cummings and Miss Weatherby in the back. The train was brought to a stop as quickly as possible and first aid administered to the injured, while Drs. Calkin, Gass and Carter were hastily summoned and rendered the necessary surgical attendance.

Dies on Way to Hospital Miss LeBlanc and Logan, whom it was found were the more seriously injured, were put in Charles Beale's motor truck and taken to the Highland View Hospital in Amherst, Miss LeBlanc succumbing to her injuries before reaching that institution. An examination revealed that death resulted from a fractured skull. One of Logan's arms was almost severed from his body, in addition to his having severe head injuries. Miss Weatherby and Cummings were placed on the train and brought to this city where their injuries were attended to. There were several eye witnesses to the accident, among them being Eloi Bourgeois. According to one witness the engine and motor car seemed to meet right at the crossing and the force of the engine carried the car down the track after overturning it. The train conductor, R. H. Clarke, said that the motor car ran into the engine, rather than the engine hitting the car. Cummings' injuries seemed to be mostly shock and a badly wrenched shoulder, while he also had a cut on his right wrist and cuts and abrasions on his face.

A DANGEROUS CROSSING SACKVILLE, June 18.—The scene of the accident, on the main road between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, is a particularly dangerous crossing, inasmuch as the view is obstructed on both sides and it is impossible to see whether or not a train is approaching from the direction of Cape Tormentine until the car is practically on the track. On one side of the track, warehouses hide the approach while on the other the heavy foliage of the trees and shrubs in the town park form an almost impenetrable screen. This same crossing has been the scene of accidents in the past and many are the narrow escapes that have been made in avoiding an accident. The only means of warning is an alarm bell off to one side of the crossing and there is not a wigwag signal or gates. The Sackville Board of Trade has been endeavoring for some time to have some more adequate device installed and it is understood, only recently received the information that an automatic wigwag signal would be installed there. The need of some safeguard is more urgently realized when it is understood that hundreds of cars each day pass to and fro, for the tourists and all other motorists wishing to visit Nova Scotia must pass over their particular stretch of road.
