FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The funeral of Mr. James E. Monahan took place from his residence yesterday morning, to the Pro-Cathedral, thence to the Catholic cemetery. A High Mass of requiem was celebrated by Father Peter Duffy, who also officiated at the grave.

MUSIC ON SQUARE.—There was a large crowd on the Square last night to listen to an excellent programme of music played by the Fourth Regiment Band, under the direction of Bandmaster Heines, to whose excellent leadership the great efficiency of this popular Band is largely due.

CITY COUNCIL.—A special meeting of the Charlottetown City Council was held Wednesday night at which the estimates for the current year were passed. The estimated expenditure is \$49,560 and the estimated income \$6,968.97 which will give a surplus of \$42,591.03. The following are some items of expenditure: City Government \$2,757, Police Department \$7,200, School Board \$15,980, Assessing and collecting taxes, \$1144, Street lighting, \$7,900, Victoria Park \$600, Maintenance of board of Health, \$865, City Hall \$75, Miscellaneous \$4,933, Sinking fund, \$1,500, interest on debentures and overdraft, \$15,25. The income included the following: Real estate, \$36,533, Personal property tax, \$14,470.16, Poll tax, \$2,800, Auto Tax, \$376, Loss discounts at appeal, \$1,200, giving a net revenue from taxation of \$52,878.27. The ordinary revenue is estimated at \$16,990.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. HERRIDGE.

The death occurred in Charlottetown at three o'clock on Tuesday morning of Mrs. Susan Herridge, at the age of 85 years. She leaves to mourn one son, William, employed on the railroad, and one daughter, Mrs. H. Aldham, of Orange, Mass. She is also mourned by sisters, Mrs. Daniel Sullivan and by sister, Mrs. Daniel Sullivan of Port Daniel, Quebec, and by one brother, Richard, who too resides in Quebec. Deceased herself was a native of Quebec, where a large circle of friends and acquaintances will deplore her demise.

MR. A. W. TANTON.

The death occurred in the Prince of Edward Island Hospital yesterday, of Mr. Arthur Tanton, of Southport, following an operation for intestinal obstruction performed on the previous day. The late Mr. Tanton had been in somewhat delicate health for some months past but was able to attend to business. On Wednesday morning he drove to Charlottetown and attended to some business matters as usual, but shortly after returning home he was taken suddenly ill. A local doctor was called in and on the latter's advice Mr. Tanton was taken to the hospital where the operation was performed immediately. He apparently recovered from the effects of the operation, but the duty of loving our fellow-men as our brethren is a duty which is not to be lightly regarded. The late Mr. Tanton was a son of the late J. P. Tanton, of Charlottetown, and was one of the Island's most prominent and most successful horticulturists and set an example in intensive farming which many might follow with advantage. From a plot of four acres of land he not only made a comfortable living for himself and family but year after year he had a surplus to add to his bank account. His garden in Southport was one of the beauty spots of the province and was visited by hundreds during the tourist season. He frequently acted as judge at mid-winter fruit shows and was recognized as an expert on agricultural and horticultural matters. He was an exemplary citizen, the soul of honor and a man whom all respected for his unswerving integrity and his conscientious adherence to duty. He was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I., on July 15th, he was preparing to attend. He leaves to mourn his wife, formerly Miss Cassie Farquharson, daughter of the late Stephen Farquharson. Southport; two sons, Stephen, in the employ of the C. I. C. in Charlottetown, and Herbert, at home with his mother; two brothers, Mr. Lewis P. Tanton and Professor H. A. Tanton, Charlottetown; also one sister, Mrs. Ethel Coombs, Charlottetown. To the relatives so suddenly bereaved The Guardian tenders its deepest sympathy.

BAPTIST ASSOCIATION CONVENTION OPENS

The opening service of the P. E. I. Baptist Association's annual convention was held in the Baptist Church last night and was largely attended. The opening sermon was preached by the Rev. L. E. Ackland, the services of an evangelistic character, being conducted by the Rev. W. P. McVie. The sermon was a fine presentation of Gospel truths, and was very well received. At the conclusion of the preaching service, Professor Thompson on the organ, and Miss Blanche Boyer and Miss Kathleen Dockendorff, who sang each a delightful solo, rendered a splendid musical programme.

SERMON BY MR. ACKLAND.

The Rev. Mr. Ackland took as his text, John 13:34: "A New Commandment I give unto you, love one another." "The little band of disciples, said the preacher, was facing the most serious danger, that of disruption. The traitor Judas had gone out, never to return. The storm that had been so long threatening was about to break upon them, before Jesus dawned Jesus would be in the hands of his foes, whose deadly malice would vent its worst on him.

"When the Lord and Master is laid low," continued Mr. Ackland, "how shall the disciples stand? Some centralising force must be applied at once to hold together that little band. The Master foresaw the danger and made abundant provision to meet it. He forged the links that can hold together in one brotherhood all that are His for all time. What is that centralising force? What is the tie that constitutes the brotherhood? Jesus did not make their unity dependent upon larger organization. He did not say 'you shall follow this or that church discipline, or elect officers or follow certain rules of order.' The Master did not seek to bind together His disciples by placing them under some constituted authority to which all must submit. He gave no bishops or elders or governing body. He wrote no creed or code of laws which He submitted to the disciples as the basis of their unity. He did not say 'you must believe in and subscribe

to this creed and then you will become an indissoluble brotherhood. Love alone was that tie, love alone, strong enough to constitute a brotherhood. An inner spiritual bond was necessary. Therefore the Master set a new commandment, to love one another. Jesus calls this obligation of love a new commandment. In what sense could it be called new? The duty of loving our fellow-men as our brethren is a duty which is not to be lightly regarded. It was the spirit of the law of Moses; love was the principle on which that law was founded. The Master set so summarily together by the tie of common racial origin. But Jesus created a new brotherhood, bound together by ties of brotherhood. This brotherhood is not merely an ideal; it is being realized. It was mightily realized during the fierce persecutions of the early Christian centuries. Men and women of all ranks in life, of all races ever, were willing to sever any tie to make any sacrifice, even life itself, in order to become members of this brotherhood. Lucian, the scoffer, caught the spirit of the Christian brotherhood when he said: "Their Master has persuaded them; they are all brethren. And another in those early times declared 'they love before they have even seen each other.'" (2). Again, this commandment was a new one because the love it enjoins arises from a new source. Members of the Christian brotherhood would love each other not because they were of the same race or family or naturally attracted to each other, but because they had a common experience with the Master Himself. No matter what other differences prevailed, they were brethren.

The tie of love was strong enough to bind together in the same brotherhood Peter and John, so utterly unlike in character, Simon the Zealot and Matthew the Publican, so utterly unlike in politics and religion. It was a new commandment because it set a new standard for love. "As I have loved you." To that extent the disciple was to love and serve his fellow-disciple. "Greater love hath no man than this," etc. The weakness of this tie is our greatest deficiency. The members of the brotherhood, the members of the body of Christ are torn away, and the brotherhood, the body, does not suffer as it ought. It is possible for us to strengthen the tie of brotherhood. This love can be cultivated. Make yourself lovable. The Master was a man full of grace and truth. Attend to meetings of the brotherhood. Continual absence breaks the tie. "Sacrifice for it. He who makes the greatest sacrifice loves the most. By this shall all men know that ye are all my disciples, if ye have love one to another."

RIOTING IN THE BOSNIAN CAPITAL.

SARAYEVO, June 29.—Anti-Serbian demonstrations are reported throughout Bosnia. In many places Serbians were attacked and troops were called out to keep order. These demonstrations necessitated the proclamation of martial law, and the commander of the troops at Sarajevo exhorted the people, saying: "If you love your emperor, then go quietly to your homes."

TO TEACH SEX HYGIENE.

CHICAGO, June 27.—The teaching of sex hygiene in Sunday schools was approved yesterday. In a report to the convention of the International Sunday School Association, by F. K. Mohr, superintendent of the purification department, "Sex knowledge will be taught," said Mr. Mohr. "If not in the home and Sunday school, it will be taught in the street. Silence is criminal. We must teach these facts, and teach them right, so that knowledge may lead to purity and righteousness."

SAYS HUERTA IS LOSING HIS HOLD.

VERA CRUZ, June 29.—The fear that the spread of dissatisfaction among the Mexican federal troops might result in an uprising in Mexico City caused the British residents there to hold a meeting on Saturday night to arrange final plans for the British refugees who arrived here today and who had attended the meeting said the general opinion expressed was that Provisional President Huerta's hold on the situation in the capital was wavering and many predicted an uprising or a revolt of the federal army within a week or ten days.
