Canadian And American Insurance Men Meet

TORONTO, Nov. 7.—"Liberty is something that must not be taken for granted," John Marshall Holcombe, Jr., Manager, Life Insurance Sales Research Bureau, Hartford, Conn., told 500 delegates to the 20th annual meeting of the Association of Life Agency Officers and Life Insurance Sales Research Men at the Royal York Hotel for the first time in their history. The prominent United States insurance companies are meeting in Canada as a gesture of goodwill to this country. The Patrons of Confederation and the founding fathers of the United States were men of great vision but failed to see one cardinal point," said Mr. Holcombe. "They assumed that liberty was something which men would always sacrifice and die. They did not see that the years of liberty would make men take liberty for granted. Amid the peace and plenty of democracy it is easy to forget that liberty is to be defended. It is hard to realize this before it is too late. Today the conquering armies of Europe are realizing it, but its realization is vastly harder than its defense."

TORONTO, Nov. 7.—(CP)—The Toronto stock market gathered momentum today as the advance advanced and the close found gold issues up 54 in the index, the industrials up 36 and the western oils up .04, while the base metals reduced a mid-afternoon loss of nearly a half point to .07. Aggregate turnover was 126,000 shares. Preston stepped along for a 15-cent gain to 3.20. Lake Shore firm-ed 3-8 to 11-8 in having active trading and gains of 5 cents were netted by Annon, Macassa, Malartic Gold Fields, Pickle Crow, Upper Canada and Wright-Haigreaves and gains of 10 cents came through for Kerr-Addison and Berens River. Normetal moved in considerable volume at a fractional loss to 85 cents, White-Amulet dropped 10 cents to 485 and losses of 1-4 point came out for Noranda and Smelters. Nickel and Hudson Bay firm-ed fractions. Ventures firm-ed 10 cents and Steep Rock 2 cents to 173. Bathurst Power A gained 1-2 to 14-4 and other industrials showing similar strength included Blue Ribbon Paper, Canada Packers, Canadian Celanese, Consolidated Bakeries, Cosmos Mills, Dominion Foundries, Hinde and Dauche, Walkers and Massey-Harris p'd. Union Gas was offered down 3-8 to 11-8. Corrugated Box p'd fell 14 points to 56 on a scale of 5 shares, Algoma Steel dropped 3-4 and Canadian Car p'd lost 3-8. Changes in the western oils were gains of 3 cents for Calgary and Edmonton, 2 cents for Dalhousie to 21 and a cent for Pacific Pete to 21.
