Sweet; Singing by choir; Recitation by Miss Christena Blue; Reading by Miss Mary Blue; Address to Soldiers; Singing by choir; Refreshments; Closing. The address to Soldiers was read by Miss Mary G. Smith, Secretary of Red Cross Society after which Mrs. J. D. Livingstone, President, presented each soldier with a suitable gift in recognition of their services to King and Country. Rev. W. H. Sweet made a brief reply on behalf of the "Soldier boys." After all present had done ample justice to the candy ice cream and cake provided by the ladies, votes of thanks were presented to Rev. Mr. Sweet for his eloquent address and to the ladies of the Red Cross Society for their reception. The meeting was brought to a successful termination by singing of National Anthem and pronouncing of Benediction.

Following is the address:  
Little Sands, P. E. I.  
May 15, 1919  
To the Returned Soldiers of Little Sands, High Bank and Hopefield.  
Dear Friends:—We, the undersigned on behalf of the Red Cross Society, desire to convey to you our heart-

felt thanks for the part which each one of you have played in the great war. You represent different branches of the army but through the long, stressful conflict you have all done nobly, and have made a significant contribution to the winning of the great struggle; the abolition of an impious military autocracy; and the preservation of the liberty of the human race. The terrible hardships of the war are over, the peril which haunted every hour, the long separation from loved ones; the anxiety of the uncertainty of the issue are all grim memories but thank God they belong to the past. During all the years of your absence upon active service loving hearts have yearned for you, earnest prayers have followed you. Now in the favoring Providence of Almighty God you have returned in safety and in the heart of every citizen in this land there throbs a genuine and hearty welcome. A long looked for hour of glad reunion is realized at last, a good fight has been fought, the goal of your warfare has been attained. Your duty has been well and faithfully done, and in extending to you a hearty welcome, we ask you to accept these gifts as a small token of our esteem of the part each of you have played in the great world war. And as you go on in life to take your part as good citizens, we hope these gifts will remind you of the Society which endeavored to look after you, comfort while you were absent on military duty. Our best wishes follow each one of you wherever your future lots may be cast.

### ARRIVAL OF THE ESSEQUIBO

PORTLAND, Me., May 17.—Five hundred and seventy one wounded Canadian soldiers and nursing sisters arrived here this afternoon from Liverpool on board the hospital ship Essequibo. Severe weather which continued for four days caused the ship to be two days late, and it was not until the ship came alongside the pier that the home-coming soldiers caught their first sight of land as the Essequibo had been creeping through fog for the last two days of the voyage.

There are forty-five cot cases, thirty five amputation cases, and 395 convalescent. Of the total number on board, twenty-four were officers, sixteen nursing sisters, and 629 of other ranks.

One death occurred on the trip from Liverpool. On May 13, Private C. J. Twamley, 44, of Halifax, died, and was buried with military honors at sea. He had been broken in health as a result of two years' confinement in German prison camps and developed bronchial pneumonia on his way home to his wife and five children.
