LOYAL DEFENCE OF THE FATHERLAND.

German Chancellor's Stirling Speech in the Reichstag Replying to a Socialist member's Criticism of Armament Expenditure—Fancy Pictures of the Fleet—Kipling not Forgotten—No Desire to Make Navy Greatest in World.

BERLIN, Jan. 28.—During the budget debate in the Reichstag to-day Herr Bebel, socialist, ascribed the empire's deficits to the enormous expenditures for the army and navy and to the futile efforts to play the first roll in the world, which Germany was unable to do. The government he continued, is afflicted with the malady of suddenness, which defeated its own aims.

Herr Bebel further said the empire's expenses for the army and navy are likely to grow even greater under the present conception of the foreign policy. Germany wanted to be first everywhere. Its attitude towards weaker states never would be tolerated towards itself. Its action towards Hayti was brusque and how, the speaker asked, can the Panther's bombardment of Fort San Carlos be justified? Continuing Herr Bebel remarked: "President Castro is struggling for life and the maintenance of the presidency. We cannot think ill of a man under such circumstances if he resists such excessive demands. The coercion of Venezuela is in the interests of the great capitalists and the Krupp firm has a share in it. Such violence should be resorted to only in the most extreme cases."

VON BUELOW REPLIES.

The chancellor in reply to Herr Bebel's criticism, said: "Herr Bebel has defended the singular behaviour of the Venezuelan government against us with a degree of animation such as I have seen in no European newspaper. President Castro doubtless will read Herr Bebel's speech with the greatest delight at his morning coffee. Let me further remark that the question at issue between Venezuela and the powers is not merely one of claims, but one of the defense by the powers of their prestige, which has been impaired through President Castro's action and through the manner in which he repudiated impolitely, to express it mildly, our just claims. We were, therefore, perfectly justified in proceeding jointly with Great Britain and Italy for the preservation of our prestige."

The chancellor then turned his attention to Herr Bebel's attack on the naval expenditures. He said: "When Herr Bebel says that naval officers retired, and on waiting orders, have written articles claiming that our fleet must be strong enough to annihilate the British navy, I answer him that this, of course, is a fancy picture which is found in the literature of all people. I point only to the imaginary battle of Dorking, which no responsible statesman dreams of, and which no reasonable man in Germany regards as possible. You can see that these articles are mere fancy pictures by consulting our fleet plan, after the completion of which our navy will occupy only fourth or fifth place among the navies of the world. We follow no aggressive plans, but purpose merely the defense of our coasts, and the protection of German interests and citizens abroad. That we should not remain defenceless at sea is the wish of the majority; I may say without exaggeration, of the great majority of the German people. If Herr Bebel contradicts this then he is out of harmony with the sentiments of the nation."

"Herr Bebel said that the expression that our future lies upon the waters, contains an aggressive aim toward other powers. Herr Bebel appears to me to have proceeded here according to the principle of imputing false motives when other means of attack were exhausted. We intend nothing of the kind. The expression quoted does not mean that we want to drive any power from the sea, but we have just as good a right to sail around on the seas as other nations have and the new German empire has this right, too."

MORE HATED THAN LOVED

Chancellor Von Buelow later in his address said that Herr Schneider (Bavarian member of the Center party) had remarked the other day that the Germans were more hated than loved in the world.

"I regard this wide generalization as incorrect," contained the chancellor. "I believe we have trustworthy political friends and that the world has not forgotten the radiant genius of the German people. I recently referred to a 'wild poet' (Kipling) who was unfavorably disposed towards us. I am glad to note to-day that the Belgo-French author, M. Materlinck, who is now in Berlin, has not improperly characterized the German people, 'the moral conscience of the world,'"

"But, even if so much hated, and dislike for us prevail as Herr Bebel, too, seems to assume, then, in my opinion, hatred and envy and hate is usually born of envy—are sweeter than pity."

"Let us keep our powder dry; let us not quarrel too much among ourselves and nobody will run foul of our waggon."

MR. CARNEGIE'S OFFER TO TORONTO.

TORONTO, Jan. 29.—The Public Library Board has received notification from Mr. Andrew Carnegie that he is prepared to pay over the sum of \$250,000 for the purpose of establishing a new central library and three branch libraries in the city of Toronto, the central to cost \$275,000, and the branches \$75,000. The offer is accompanied by the usual stipulation. It is probable this offer will be accepted.

LADRONES VICTORIOUS.

MANILA, Jan. 28.—It is reported here that the volunteer force organized at Bolinao, province of Zambales, for the purpose of dispersing the ladrones in that vicinity has been defeated and that three Americans, including Mr. Osborne, a teacher, were killed. The ladrones outnumbered the volunteers, surrounded the latter and boled them. The Americans died fighting. The details of the affair obtainable at present are meager.

AN OFFICIAL'S ACCOUNTS.

TORONTO, Jan. 29.—A New London cable says: It is rumored in well connected Canadian circles that the accounts of an official located in the motherland show serious discrepancy aggregating a large amount. The friends of the official are to make restitution provided he is retained in office.

CANADA'S PRIMATE TO RETURN.
