WITH CLANSMAN GROUP
THE BIRTH OF A NATION
AT THE PRINCE EDWARD WEDNESDAY AND THURSDAY.
When David W. Griffith started the outdoor staging of the Civil War and Re-constructed scenes in "The Birth of a Nation" which will be shown at the Prince Edward Wednesday and Thursday he was confronted with seemingly insuperable difficulties. An area of private war was required, a bout as large as the corner of Belgium occupied by the Anglo-French forces. Thousands of cavalrymen has to be shown, in an historic raid of the North Carolina class. Their run was to be over many, many miles of typical Southern sandy roads. Though an acknowledged wizard of the films, Mr. Griffith is not a "War lord" with power to commandeer.
In this emergency, the county authorities of "The Birth of a Nation" producing locale were applied to. They finally consented to mark off an area of ten square miles for the use of the horsemen. Along all the roads within this area, the county commissioners posted notices forbidding all traffic on "the day of days." Post-trains were also warned off. But the roads themselves did not look southern. David Griffith handled this difficulty with the authorities' permission—by remarking such of the highways as would come within the camera's eye. Many tons of sand and gravel were spread by gangs of his workmen. Landscape engineering changed the look of the landscape to the rounded hills, piney woods and deep gullies of old North State. The race of the northern clansmen to reach their South Carolina brethren took place on the appointed day without an accident or a flaw. After it was over, Mr. Griffith's men scaped the sand off the Macadan Roads, took down the signs, and life in the sleepy countryside resumed its normal course. It cost about \$25,000 to do this—the producer thinks it was worth all it cost, particularly after hearing the enthusiastic comments of "The Birth of a Nation" patrons on his work. NOTICEABLE TRAFFIC INCREASE IN AND OUT OF BRITISH PORTS
LONDON, March 24.—The Times naval correspondent commenting on today's figures of submarine losses says: "The most noticeable feature is the increase in traffic in and out of British ports. The figures are higher than they have been in any of the earlier returns. . . . When the target is larger it may be expected there will be a proportionate increase in the number of hits."
The official report reads: "For the week ending March 18 merchant vessels of all nationalities of over 400 tons, exclusive of fishing and local craft, United Kingdom ports: Arrivals, 2,228; sailing, 2,544. "British merchantmen sunk by mine or submarine, of 1,600 tons gross or over; 15 under 1,600 tons, 8. "British merchantmen unsuccessfully attacked, including one during this week ending March 11, 19. "British fishing vessels sunk, including 17 sailers, 21."
