McGILL will send a Rhodes scholar to Oxford again this year, as Laval University has not sent up a candidate. This will make the third for McGill.

St. MARY'S dramatic class returned from a trip to P. E. Island on Saturday night. They played at Summerside and Charlottetown, and speak in high terms of praise of the reception accorded them in both towns. —Halifax Mail.

THE "Martha Clark Mission Band" of the Baptist Church will hold a sale of plants, cut flowers, candy and ice-cream on the grounds adjoining the Baptist Parsonage, Fitzroy street, from 3 to 6 this afternoon. Proceeds are in aid of Plano Fund. The Mission Band hope to have your attendance and patronage.

W. S. McKIE, city shipped Tuesday for the American Market three fine pairs of horses. Among the lot were Lady and Admiral Togo, the latter sired by that well known sire of good horses, Providr Admiral Togo was a perfect horse in every detail. A pair of handsome dark dappled browns and a fine pair of bays completed the lot, making six of the best looking horses ever shipped from this port.

It is proposed to establish a college in British Columbia under the University of McGill. Vancouver College is at present affiliated with McGill, but the arrangement of having to send students to Montreal has proved unsatisfactory, and either a provincial university will be established or the course of the present college will be extended and arranged so as to prepare for degrees at McGill.

THE marriage rate in England in 1903, according to the report of the registrar-general, was 15.6 to every 1,000 of the population. This rate is stated to be the lowest since 1895. The marriage rate in Nova Scotia in 1904, according to the provincial secretary's report of marriages and the census returns of population, with an allowance of say 3,000 for increase of population, was about 12.4 to every 1,000 of the population.

A short time ago officers of the law in New Glasgow, seized liquors valued at \$280 from the Vendome Hotel in that town, and on June 3 destroyed the same in front of the Court House that. The quantity and nature of the liquors destroyed, were: 34 bottles of Gin; 37 bottles of Whiskey, 31 bottles of Beer, 12 bottles of Rum, 18 bottles of Brandy, 11 partly empty bottles, mixed liquor; 2 cases of Whiskey, 1 jar of Whiskey, 1 jar Port Wine.

THE Amherst Telegram says: "Both local papers pointed out on Saturday that for the first time in three years the Town Bank account showed a credit balance. This circumstance is not without considerable significance, although many may attach an improper significance to it. It does not mean that the Town is any better governed now than it has been during the three preceding years, although we have no doubt that some of our readers would so construe the paragraph in question. It does however, afford a satisfactory assurance that the present year is one of good times, and that, despite a rigorous winter, and a backward spring, money is easy as money goes in a town of this size. When we find property owners paying twelve thousand dollars in taxes in one day to effect a saving of the discount, it is reasonable to conclude that the present year is rather more rich in bounty than its immediate predecessors have been."

LAST Friday evening Rev. T. F. Fuller, son lectured in Cardigan on "The Russian—Japanese War". The lecturer carried the large audience with him from sea to land and from land to sea as he dealt with the leading episodes of the war from the beginning to the present time; while the beautiful and realistic stereopticon views served to fix them in the memory forever. Before and after the lecture solos were sung by Miss Canning and Mr. Brommer of Charlottetown and Miss McDonald of Cardigan. To say that the audience was delighted with the singing of these well known soloists is to put it mildly. The entertainment was under the auspices of the Presbyterian Guild and was in every way a decided success.

MAJOR C. MCKINNON, formerly of Rose Hill, Lot 16, but now the possessor of the valuable and historical farm of Glenalade, near Tracadie, was in Summerside Saturday. Mr. McKinnon is well pleased with his purchase and feels sure that he owns the finest farm property in the province. Glenalade, which belonged to Sir William Macdonald and his brother, John A. Macdonald, has been in the possession of the one family for more than a century. It is situated 12 miles from Charlottetown and consists of 529 acres of land, 280 acres of which are cleared. The rest is covered with standing timber. The cleared portion is divided by dikes into fields of ten acres each. The barn, 300 feet long and 60 feet wide, is built of brick, cost \$22,000 and is one of the most modern in Canada. It is so arranged that a loaded team can drive right into the loft. The dwelling house, which cost \$15,000, is a three-story brick and stone building, 50 feet by 50 feet, is provided with all modern conveniences. There is an excellent system of waterworks on the place, established at a cost of \$5,000, which supplies not only the dwelling house and the stables but every field on the farm with pure running water. Glenalade possesses forty chains of shore front with large quantities of mud and seaweed for fertilizing purposes as well as very valuable fishing privileges. —Farmer.

Geo. BELL, the young man spoken of in The Transcript on Friday evening as being missing from Mill River, P. E. I., passed through the city on Saturday afternoon en route to his home on the Island. He was in charge of his brother, John Bell, who complained that the United States immigration agents would not allow him to take his brother, George, to a New York hospital for medical treatment. Money he said was "no object." Geo. Bell is a fine looking young man 34 years of age and his father, Andrew Bell of Mill River, P. E. I., is a well to do farmer there. Last fall George went to the Canadian West with a farmer's excursion and was in excellent health. But he suddenly returned home mentally deranged. His friends became afraid that he might destroy himself and his brother, John, who is a well off young man in California, was sent for. About ten days ago George escaped from his father's house and was missing for some days, and as stated in The Transcript, fears were entertained as to his safety. He was found at the residence of a relative and John Bell started to take him to a New York hospital on Friday and was returned as above stated. Geo. Bell himself is in good financial circumstances and his case is a very sad one indeed. His brother, John, is the only one who can persuade George to remain quiet any length of time and he was so fatigued from his journey that he hired Sgt. Baxter of the St. John police force to accompany him to his home at Mill River with his brother. John Bell said he had \$300 in his pocket when he was turned back and he did not know what the immigration officials wanted when he had medical certificates to show that he was going to an American hospital where he expected to pay for any treatment given to his sick brother.—Moncton Transcript.

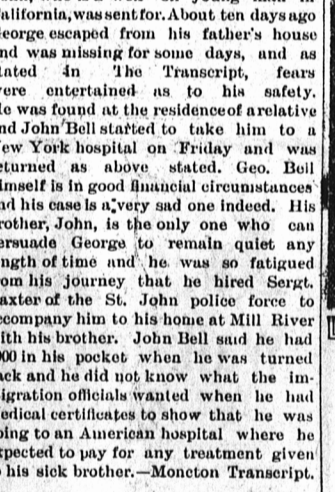
