USING NATURE'S COMPASSES

The motor camper or picnicker who feels very keenly the absence of a compass in his equipment when lost in the woods, can use Nature to good advantage in compensating for his lack of foresight. One can get one's bearings if one knows that the bark of trees usually is heavier on the north side and that branches are more numerous on the south. Moss grows on the north side, as another indication. Nature serves well in such a predicament, but a compass is simpler to read.

TIP ON TIMING GEARS

Car owners might do well to endure a slight humming for a few days after new timing gears have been put in the car. It means the gears will fit better after they have worn in. The motor owner who demands quietness in this part of the car, frequently makes his appeal so strong that a smaller camshaft gear is installed to hum him. When the gears begin to wear, they make more noise than ever.

WHYS OF WHEEL WOBBLE

Worn or loosely adjusted parts are not always to blame for front wheel wobble. Loose front spring clips, excessively large tires, tires of unequal weight, sagging rear springs, worn shackles or broken leaves may be the cause of the trouble.

ABOUT APPLYING BRAKES

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 18.—All indications are that the war between the friends and enemies of Governor "Al" Smith, of New York in the Democratic party will soon be on in earnest, by way of preparation for the national convention of 1928.
Nobody here doubts that Governor Smith is going to sweep New York again this fall. He seems sure to be chosen governor again by a heavy vote. The Republicans are worried lest he carry the senatorship with him and defeat Senator Wadsworth. But regardless of the senatorship, Governor Smith will get the governorship again and that fact will add to the enthusiasm of his admirers who want to see him nominated for president by his party in 1928.
Just months, the Smith lieutenant have been working in many states to pave the way for his nomination in 1928. Other Democratic aspirants have been more or less inactive.
Lately, the opponents of Governor Smith have been showing signs of stirring themselves. It looks as if the fight between the Smith and anti-Smith forces would develop in earnest this winter. In the present pre-election campaign for control of Congress, which will end with the election in November, the Democrats will hold down the Smith and anti-Smith issue as much as possible.
Not only is the Smith and anti-Smith struggle developing, but there is sure to be a powerful movement under way in the Democratic party before many months to side-track both Smith and McAdoo for the presidency and compromise on some other man, such as former Senator Pomeroy of Ohio, or Senator Reed, of Missouri.
