Hints for the Motorist

OIL PRESSURE RUNS LOW

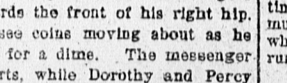


L. M. L. writes: The engine of my car has pressure of fuel to main and connecting-rod bearings, with a spring-controlled by pass to handle excess of oil pumped. During the summer the pressure gage indicated 5 lbs. at idle speed and 12 lbs. at 35 m. p. h., but at present time it shows but 4 lbs. at idle and 8 lbs. at the above speed. Instructions state that the pressure should be 5 to 7 lbs. idling when oil is warm. Putting in fresh oil does not raise the pressure. Before changing the spring pressure at the by-pass, I should

like to know what has caused the pressure to become less.

Answer: You may find that dirt has collected between the ball valve of the by-pass and its seat, thus causing a constant leak there, even when it should be tightly closed. You can probably reach this ball with a bent wire and unseat it fully several times, allowing it to snap back into position and this should remove the dirt, but if you find the ball seated properly the only thing to do is to increase the spring action by means of the regulating screw.

ANTI-FREEZE QUESTIONS



L. P. asks: How long can a car be left out of doors, without danger of freezing, if glycerine non-freeze solution is used in the cooling system? In the case of the alcohol anti-freeze mixture, do both the alcohol and the water freeze, when the temperature becomes sufficiently low?

Answer: If a mixture of one-half glycerine and one-half water, by volume, is used a car can be left out of doors indefinitely, as temperatures above 0 degree Fahrenheit without danger of damage. With a solution made up of 70 per cent. water and 30 per cent. of a mixture consisting of equal parts of glycerine and alcohol, indefinite exposure to temperatures about zero will involve no danger, in the case of the alcohol-water mixture, when freezing finally occurs, it is the water that congeals and crystals of it can be distinguished floating in unfrozen alcohol. The mixture is then of a slushy character, but not capable of exerting severe bursting pressures.

MUFFLER EXPLOSIONS WHEN COASTING

M. G. J. asks: What is the cause of the peculiar rattling or spitting sound that comes from the muffler-pipe of a car when it is drifting down hill or running very closely throttled.

Answer: These sounds are caused by slight muffler explosions. There is evidently some missing of explosions and the small unburned charges are reflected to the muffler and fired by the exhaust flame from succeeding explosions. The special carburetor used upon this car, appears to give rather a weak and somewhat combustible mixture, when extremely closely throttled and makes misfires and consequent things in the muffler more than usually likely to occur. It is usual experience that the noises you speak of can be prevented by enriching the mixture with the dashboard adjustment, when coasting, but this is hardly a practical remedy. We fear that this noise is inseparable from the use of the peculiar carburetor employed.
