HOSPITALITY.

It isn't the expensiveness of the eats nor the novelty of the stunts, nor the elaborateness of the decorations which makes a party a success. It is the jollity which is begotten by a hearty welcome, by congenial companions, and by a comfortable feeling of ease and naturalness.

If you are planning to have company, first choose with care those whom you will invite. Not all nice people enjoy being together. Dispositions, even of your best friends, may be incompatible.

Let a hearty welcome meet your guests at the door. Have eats which are simple but delicious and do not make a lot of formality to serve. Then have some games or entertainment, prepared in advance, that the moments will not be empty nor dull nor embarrassing—and let the guests go with a good will and ease to the rest. If your guests will not forget when it comes time to go home, I miss my guess. There is nothing so jolly as the intimate little party when good friends get close together.

NIP THAT COLD.

A cold may be side-tracked when it is just beginning, but must run its course if neglected at the start. To nip a cold in the bud, use a mild warm salt water douche to cleanse the nose and head, gargle well with salt water several times a day, wear a compress at night for three nights, take a laxative, drink lots of water, and get all the sleep you can in a warm bed but with the windows open. ANKLES WHICH TURN.

If you often turn your ankles, this is an indication that you are not strong and well nourished or else you are wearing shoes which are not built right. It may be that you are not eating enough fresh fruits and vegetables and eggs and milk to keep your bones healthy. Your shoes should have low, wide heels to provide a broad base for carrying your weight; and they should fit snugly around the heel so that your foot cannot slip. It is possible to buy shoes which are one width in the front half of the foot and another in the back half, as Letter "B" for the front half and "A" for the back half.

COOKING VEGETABLES.

Strong vegetables, such as cabbage, cauliflower and turnips, should be cooked with the cover off, to permit some of the strong flavor to escape. If green beans, spinach or other green vegetables are cooked tightly covered, then turn dark and lose their attractive green color. Cook them in a little water, with the cover off the kettle, then, when the water has nearly boiled off, cover them and turn the fire low, and let them complete their cooking in the steam from the water which is left. They will be more crisp if so cooked.

Potatoes and squashes are better baked or steamed, as this helps to retain their delicate flavors and mineral salts. To boil them in water dissolves and washes away much of their food value.

ICE CREAM PIE.

Make pie crust and bake it on the back of gem tins, to form patty shells. Into each of these, put a half a peach with the cup lid up. Fill this cavity with ice cream and cover with a meringue made with the white of an egg and a little sugar. Put this in a hot oven and brown quickly over the top. The ice cream will not melt, as the meringue acts as a seal to shut out the air.

Ice cream may be used similarly on sponge cake. Spread a thick layer of ice cream over the top and sides of a sponge cake; cover with a meringue, and brown quickly in a hot oven. Care must be taken in both these dishes to have the meringue thoroughly covered the cream.

MUFFIN TINS.

The muffin tin is a very valuable and versatile utensil, the many uses of which most of us do not appreciate. Not merely is it useful for muffins, but biscuits from bread dough may be made in it. Pie-dough patties to hold creamed meats or vegetables may be shaped to the reverse side and baked. Individual pies and tarts, corn breads, and cup cakes may be baked in the separate wells.

The muffin tin is also valuable for making custards, baking eggs, or making meat souffles. Eggs may be poached in the muffin tin, which is set in a pan of hot water. The muffin tin is just the thing for baking apples or such vegetables as green peppers and onions. They will keep their shape better and being more exposed to heat, will bake quicker. Fill the unused spaces of the muffin tin with water to prevent them from burning.

MAIL COURIER REMEMBERED

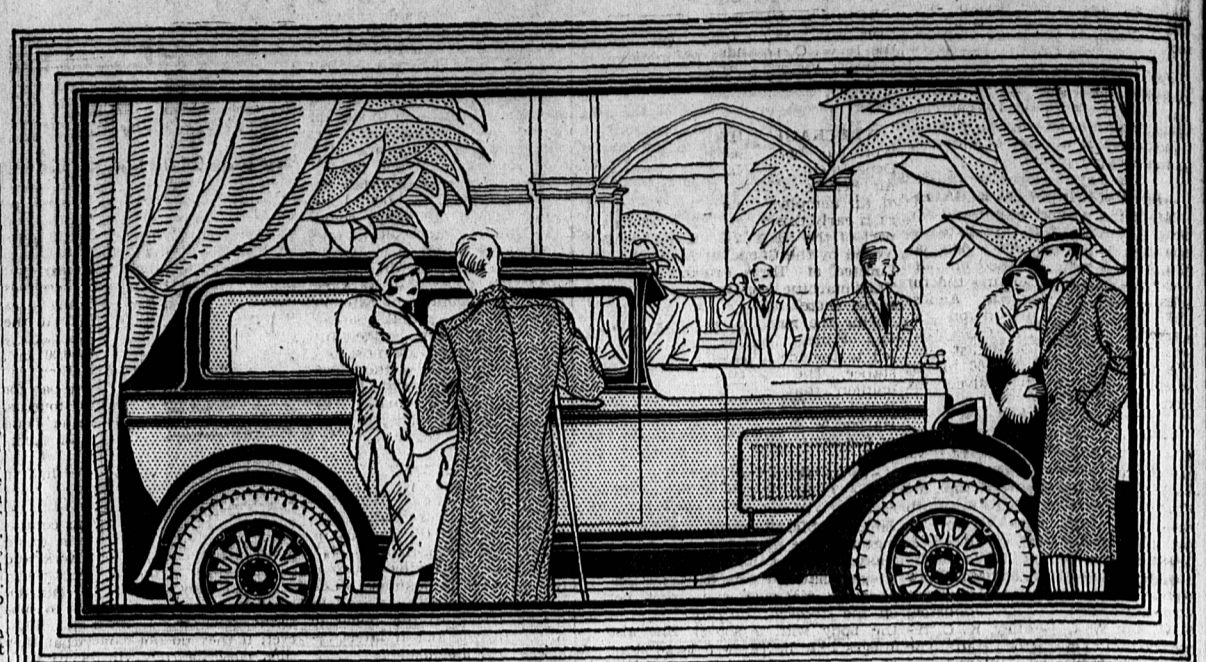
