**LIQUID ASSETS IN PONZI'S CELLAR.**

Said to be More Valuable Than Contents of House.

(Boston Globe)

The house of Charles Ponzi in Lexington is said to be very beautiful, and also expensively furnished. In fact, people who have visited the premises while Mr. Ponzi resided there as a celebrity have related tales of splendor—of "book-cases crammed with Liberty bonds." Now it appears that all of the assets of the financial prodigy are not on the first floor or above, as he himself seems to believe. The contents of this cellar in Lexington turn out to be more valuable than the house.

The receiver in bankruptcy will, therefore, find some assets of the defunct Securitas Company which are even more liquid than a banker would relish—at least in his business capacity.

Unless some Federal avenue is arranged, the receiver will not be permitted to sell this "private stock," although it is reported to be of rare value. In the United States there is at least \$100,000,000 invested in whisky stocks from which people would like to get their money. The officials in charge cannot dispose of it, except for medicinal purposes. The Government in Washington is divided in opinion on legislative action in regard to its purchase and destruction.

In the Ponzi case tied up in the cellar at Lexington, is the money of a lot of people. If the Government would permit, it is likely that many of the creditors of the defunct company would be quite willing to change their gold bonds for some golden brew, and call it a bargain. The liquid is part of the assets—and there are creditors enough to go round.
