

A HIDDEN MENACE TO THE POULTRY FLOCK
 (Experimental Farm News)
 The harmful effects of lice and mites on poultry not being immediately visible, their presence is often not detected until large numbers of them exist.
 At the Dominion Experimental Station at Harrow, Ont., frequent examinations of the birds and fixtures for the pests have proved that eradication is fairly simple when carried out during the early stages of infestation.
 The common body louse inhabits the area around the vent of the bird and usually the egg clusters of the insects can be seen adhering to the base of the abdominal feathers of the birds.
 Mites prefer to spend the day on the under side of the roosts or in cracks or nail holes in the building, making nightly visits to the resting fowl to feed. Because of the different habits of the parasites, methods of control must vary accordingly.
 A smear of nicotine sulphate, a half inch wide along the top of the roost put on before dark, will rid every bird must be on the roost. Heavy infestations may require a repeat application. A small quantity of blue ointment smeared on the skin around the vent of the bird is an effective treatment, though taking more time. Blue ointment should not be used when eggs are required for hatching. Sodium fluoride dusted into the feathers is still another way of exterminating lice. The poisonous nature of these insecticides requires cautious handling.
 Slow drying, oil bearing sprays are usually recommended as a treatment against the so called red mite. Crude carbolic, used motor oil, or any disinfectant having a cresote base, diluted with kerosene should be sprayed forcibly into the places where the mites are lurking. Because mites multiply at a rapid rate, a thorough

MOSS MEANS MONEY TO N. S. COMMUNITY
 Donkin, N. S., Sept. 8. - (CP) - Donkin, still termed the ghost town of Nova Scotia, is experiencing its first taste of prosperity since its one small coal mine closed 22 years ago.
 The new business life comes from the growing interest taken in the gathering of Irish Moss, which when processed, is used in hundreds of products as a gelatinous cohesive. Last year 100 families augmented their meagre income to the extent of \$6,000 in the Irish Moss trade.
 Last year Donkin folk sent 100,000 pounds of moss to United States factories. This year they say they will be sending still more and report that the market is good and the supply plentiful.
 But so far this year the "mossers" have a beef. The weather has been too good and the moss remains with suction-like tenacity on the rocks beneath the water.
 But still Donkin is thankful. In this new industry the tiny community still living in the depression atmosphere of the 30's, sees hope.

CANADA AUTO IMPORTS CUT DRASTIC IN N. Z.

 AUCKLAND, N. Z. Sept. 10 - (CP) - Although the 1948 schedule of New Zealand import licences provides for drastic reductions in the value of Canadian motor-vehicles which may be imported next year as compared with this year, importers are hopeful the value will be considerably increased later.
 It is recalled the 1947 basis has been increased several times during the year. The 1948 schedule is looked on by many motor traders as an initial allocation only, and which may be revised later according to the supply and dollar situation.
 Licences for vehicles from all sources are cut for 1948 as compared with the final value of the 1947 licences. Vehicles from Britain suffer least. So far no provision has been made for any imports from the United States.
 The schedule allows for the importation of 1948 of Canadian cars to the value of \$1,333,000, compared with final totals of \$3,200,000 in 1947. It also provides for the import of Canadian trucks valued at \$570,000 compared with \$2,880,000 in the present year.
 Per cars from Britain the schedule provides for imports valued at \$9,500,000 in 1948 compared with \$13,888,000 in the present year. Allowance is also made for British trucks valued at \$1,600,000 compared with \$2,688,000 in 1947.
 In the current year licences have been issued for cars worth \$1,484,000 and trucks worth \$960,000 from the United States but no provision is made for either type of vehicle from this source in the coming year.
