Muddling the Finances

According to Premier Saunders, the increase in liabilities incurred by his Government is \$29,000. According to the Liberal members of the Public Accounts Committee, the increase is \$391,943.

High Cost of Prisons

Like almost everything else under the Saunders Government the cost of running our prisons has risen enormously.

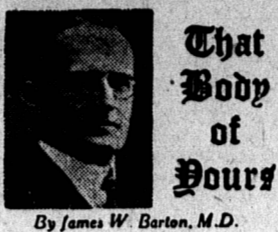
About the coming plebiscite by which it is proposed to decide whether the teachers shall or shall not be given the increased salary they have been demanding—a good deal of curiosity is manifested.

Sydney Mines Welcome Former Island Pastor

Sydney Mines.—On Friday evening in St. Andrew's church Sunday school hall, a formal welcome was extended to the recently inducted pastor, Rev. A. Quincy MacDowell, by members of the congregation.

Neil Stewart, chairman of the Board of Trustees, was chairman for the evening, and on the platform were Rev. A. Quincy MacDowell, Rev. J. B. Anderson, of Clyde Avenue Baptist church; Rev. H. Clarke, of Trinity Anglican church; Rev. F. M. Hartley, Cerman United; Alexander Boyd, Senior, member of session, Ensign Mercer of the Salvation Army, sent regrets, being unable to attend.

A short program of solo numbers was given by Mrs. C. McInyre, Mrs. James Guest, Mrs. D. Richards, Miss Margaret MacRae and Dr. D. R. MacLean. The chairman, in an address of humorous vein, addressed the audience, and gave some very interesting and not generally known facts regarding the past history of St. Andrew's during the ministry of seven clergymen.

The church, he said, dated back to 1836, when it was established as a mission field, under the supervision of the late Rev. James Frazer, who came from Scotland and settled in Boularderie, in 1840 he dedicated to the service of God the first Presbyterian church in Sydney Mines. The same year, by answer to an appeal, the Glasgow Colonial committee sent the late Rev. Matthew Wilson in 1842 and labored in the field for 41 years, resigning his charge in 1883.

Another interesting feature of the evening's program was a speech made by Alexander Boyd, senior cleric, who has the distinction of working during the ministry of the seven clergymen heretofore mentioned, and who still takes a keen interest in the affairs of St. Andrew's generally. Before the conclusion of the evening a social period was enjoyed, when refreshments were served by the ladies of the Women's League.

The address to Rev. Mr. MacDowell reads as follows: Rev. A. Quincy MacDowell: "Rev. and Dear Sir.—We are assembled here this evening for the specific purpose of extending you our sincere and cordial welcome to our town and congregation, and we confess that we feel somewhat elated at being so fortunate in having this privilege accorded us.

"A meeting of our congregation being duly called some time ago, for the purpose of moderating in a call, this meeting was in every sense of the word, one of the most helpful and inspiring our congregation has ever held. When you were made the unanimous choice of our congregation, some of our people at that time entertained fears that existing circumstances might prevent you from accepting a call to this part of the Lord's vineyard.

"However, these fears were removed and we were delighted beyond measure to learn a short time later that you had accepted our call. So we are here tonight to facilitate you and to express to you in no uncertain terms the joy and pleasure it gives us in having this exceedingly happy privilege of welcoming you as our seventh pastor since the organization of our church ninety years ago.

"We have one regret. It is nothing but our fault ours that you come here at a most unfortunate time, when nature is at its worst.
