## THE BANDS ON PARADE.

### Halifax Vies With Toronto The Part That Our Island Militia Took.

SAILED IN A SNOW-SQUALL.

HALIFAX, Oct 21—(Special)—The Royal Party left this morning in a heavy snow squall.

THE NAVAL PROCESSION.  
At ten o'clock sharp the Ophir backed out from her dock yard and took her place in the naval procession. A torpedo boat, then the destroyer Quail, the Tribune, Callias, Psyche, Crescent, Ophir, Diadem and Riobe.

THE PARTING SALUTE.  
There was a royal salute from Citadel Hill and bands playing on all the ships, thousands of people stood on the water front and another salute was fired from York Redoubt.

THE ESCORTING SHIPS.  
Only the Niobe and Diadem go to Newfoundland with the Ophir, the other ships returning to this port.

LORD MINTO RETURNS TO OTTAWA.  
At noon Lord Minto and Suite set out for Ottawa, the Royal Canadians forming the guard of honor.

ROBBERY ON THE OPHIR.  
A robbery occurred on Sunday on board the Ophir, a valuable gold watch, a family heirloom being stolen from the room of the Duke of Teck; also a wallet containing a number of souvenirs.

STOLEN AT DINNER TIME.  
The officials who manned the royal train were dining aboard and Sir Wilfred Laurier and several ministers were dining with the Duke at the time.

## DUKE AND DUCHESS SAIL FOR ENGLAND

### In a Snow Squall, While Bands Play and Cannon Thunder a Parting Salute.

## THE OPHIR CONVOYED BY SIX SHIPS DEPARTS

### And so it's all over—Lord Minto Returns to Ottawa—Robbery of Duke of Teck's Room on Board While Royalty and the Notables Were Dining—Two Ships Attend the Ophir to Newfoundland, the Others Returning.

The Northumberland arrived in port at 6 o'clock yesterday morning having on board the Militia and their friends. A GUARDIAN representative immediately interviewed one of the contingent and secured the following:

A life-long memorable event is over, the excitement of it is still in our eyes and fingertips. It is not wise to attempt anything but the relation of the facts as they 'hark back' in ones memory.

Our trip over in the stout and comfortable Northumberland was as usual when Neptune is complacent very pleasant.

A rather tedious wait at Picton, then entrainment for Halifax. The devotees of Morpheus take strange attitudes for their devotions. In some cars the drowsy God was flouted, song and story greeted Aurora who appeared sulky and lachrymose. At Truro the restaurant was a soothing mass of humanity. The all too soon "all aboard" brought forth a throng who discussed their edibles as they ran. Old Sol ashamed of his youngest-born's caprices smiled on us and wroiled into Richmond station a merry smiling at discomforts party. The dignity of an arrival at North St. was denied us nor did we get an opportunity to see decorations very highly spoken of.

To the inspiring strains of the 4th Regiment Band we covered the mile and a half to our quarters in the new Exhibition building at Willow Park. We found a half dozen blankets a man, and selected that number of boards, dumped our blankets on the place selected, hung up our accoutrements as best we might and were then at home. On the upper floor No. 1 Co., 4th Reg. C. A. kept a watchful eye on their comrades beneath, while a rich landscape, added to the pleasures of their matutinal ablutions. The second floor saw No. 2 Co., 4th. C. A. opposite the Band, flanked by the 93rd Band and the Field Hospital men. On the lower floor, C. A. 93rd, and 82nd fraternized. The first dinner was not a pronounced success nor did any succeeding meal attain the dignity of being called a satisfactory, let alone a successful meal. However we were not there to eat so we did the best we could. The afternoon found us making ourselves at home, the evening was spent in seeing the town attending the opera or the concert by the

famous Marine Band of the Ophir. The latter a musical treat deemed equal to Sousa's by some of our boys. Then to bed, straw was at hand and those who wished interposed a few inches of straw between their blankets and the boards. The night was very cold, a piercing wind sang through the broken panes of glass or sent showers of chaff and dust on the recumbent forms at every opening of the doors. Fatigue conquered discomfort and all heard with regret the bugle which sounds the rouse. (Not a rousing sound at 5 a. m. on a bleak November morning.)

Breakfast over pipe clay and brass brush were in brisk demand. The trumpets of the cavalry and Field Artillery who were quartered in adjoining buildings vied with our own bugles in martial call, each one followed by its own particular response of activity by individuals or units. Anon the "Dress" sounded the last brush down was given by a 93rd Bandsman to his brother from the Island, or an Artilleryman gave the finishing touch to an A. M. C.'s belt. Fraternity was in the air. Hardly formed up on parade than amidst the blare of trumpets the field guns went thundering past the entrance. Followed at a smart trot by the Cavalry and then the steady swing of the Infantry, the closing fours of the composite battalion containing some of the flowers of the foot service in equipment, deportment and gait.

The streets were thronged with people whose pleased and excited faces gave evidence of the worth of the occasion. A pretty sight was that along Lockman Street, from the depot down the street the troops were lined, faced inwards, an interval of a couple of paces between men. The Royal Canadians flanked our left while our right rested on a point near to Jacob Street. Handsome equipage with outriders in state liveries, gayly caparisoned aides dashed by and relieved the sense of waiting.

At last the guns from the ship belched forth welcome, each ship in turn echoing its sister, and in the distance we spy the brilliant cavalcade. The Canadians are at the "present" while we stand at the "shoulder" the distant rumbling of the drums telling us that the band is voicing the prayer that we are soon to take up and pass on to our brothers on the right. "General salute" rang in stentorian tones from the Captain of No. 1 and with one impulse the gun-sprang to their "present." The Governor-General had an entourage that at any other time would have attracted inspection: all eyes however turned to the escort following. First came a cordon of police then a troop of Hussars, aides and staff officers in full dress blazonry, magnificent chargers, handsomely caparisoned, then, guarded on each side by Hussars came the State carriage.

Immediately preceding were two of the Life Guards, their silver helmets and breastplates glittering, dazzlingly in the sun. Saluting as he passed along with a smile interested and genial, sat the future King of the great British realm and the wider territories which will own him Emperor. The face is a clever one, confidence inspiring one. This may be less majesty, I trust not however, but on looks for worth, power and dignity. Should it be God's will that George IV come in due time to the throne, his subjects if physiognomy may be trusted, will find his character but the reflex of his face. But a cursory glance at the Duchess and one saw a face that is full of sweetness and dignity and giving promise that its owner will worthily hold the lesser orb of regal authority.
