**Yankees Take the Opening Game of World's Series**

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, Oct. 4.—Before the greatest crowd that ever witnessed a world series game variously estimated at from seventy to eighty thousand, the St. Louis Cardinals, standard bearers of the National League today, invaded the home grounds of the New York Yankees, six time American League champions, for the opening game of baseball's biggest and most colorful show. In the crowd of notable men from all walks of life was Field Marshal Viscount Allenby, famous British soldier who occupied a box with baseball Commissioner Landis. Adjoining it was a box occupied by Connie Mack, veteran pilot of the Athletics, who lost out in their effort to stop the Yankees in the American League.

Ten minutes before game time the general admission seats were nearly all filled and with the promises of plenty of standers in the less remote section of the big stadium, the attendance was estimated at more than 70,000. The largest attendance at one of the 1926 world series games which brought the same two teams together was 63,600.

White Hoyt and Bill Sherdel, the rival pitchers went out to warm up just as Judge Landis, High Commissioner of baseball showed up beside the visitors dugout and posed for the photographers.

**GAME BY INNINGS**

**First Inning**

Cardinals: High up—High fanned swinging for the third strike. Frisch up. Frisch popped out to Bengough, who raced to the screen to make a catch. Bottomley up. Bottomley grounded out to Gehrig, unassisted.

No runs, no hits, no errors.

Yankees: Ruth up—Ruth got a double in the left field, hooking over Sherdel's slow balls. Gehrig up. Sherdel tossed out Gehrig at first. Ruth holding on. Meusel up. Ruth and Meusel scored on Meusel's home run into the right field bleachers. Lazzari up. Lazzari popped to Wilson back of the plate. Dugan up. Maranville went back to take Dugan's hot. Two runs, two hits, no errors.

Yankees: Meusel sent a slow dribbler to Sherdel and was thrown out at first. Durocher up. Durocher struck out. Dugan up. Ball two. Dugan's grounder was kicked around by Maranville, and it was an error for the short stop. Bengough up: Bengough flied out to Harper.

**Open Range Sets High Standard for Westerns**

In any line of commercial endeavor there is one individual or one company who by the excellence of its production establishes a standard for comparison.

Which is simply by way of saying that the author-producer combination of Zane Grey and Paramount is the standard by which Western screen entertainment is measured.

"Open Range" which opened yesterday at the Capitol Theatre, is the latest production to prove the supremacy of the Zane Grey stories as scenario material. As adapted by John Stone and J. Walter Ruben, this new picture of romance and adventure in the menacing dangers of the old west "Open Range" is a worthy successor to the long series which includes "Wanderer of the Waste-land," "The Vanishing American," "Forsaken River," "Drums of the Desert" and many others. Clifford Smith has directed in a vigorous style in keeping with the virility of the story.

Briefly, it recounts the adventure in love of one Tex Smith, a cowboy who was good and kind. He sees a picture of Lucy Blake, falls in love with the subject and determines to win her as his wife. But it proves a harder task than he imagines, for it leads him into intrigue, danger and disgrace. With an almost overwhelming accusation of cattle-rustling lodged against him, he is able to square himself only by saving the girl's village from an Indian attack by stampeding a cattle herd into it.

It is the most thrilling climax ever seen in a Western picture by this writer.

The cast is interesting, not only because of admirable performances, but because it offers new faces for Zane Grey fans. Lane Chandler, newest of the screen "discoveries" is the handsome, up-standing hero. Betty Bronson, the "Peter Pan" boy who was good and kind, is the heroine in this first Western. And Fred Kohler, known as a "wolf of the screen" plays a half-breed with convincing menage.

This week end brings to a close "The Scarlet Arrow" and the opening chapter of the new Capitol serial "Terrible People."

**DOYLE FORSAKES PSYCHIC WORLD**

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 3.—Sir Conan Doyle, noted English spiritualist and parent mind of Sherlock Holmes, has abandoned his vigorous missionary campaign on behalf of spiritualism.

The steadily increasing strain which the growing demands upon his time for lectures has brought during the past few years has resulted in partial retirement from the world of ectoplasm he told the United Press today.

Sir Arthur's retirement was fore shadowed in the International Physic's Gazette, and the noted spiritualist confirmed the report today declaring he desired to devote more time to writing.

"My resumption of writing on a larger scale, however, does not mean the resurrection of Sherlock Holmes," he said.

"I am simply abandoning my lecturing and church work due to the demand upon my time. It must not be taken to indicate that I have lost interest in spiritualism."

Sir Arthur will sail Oct. 25 for South Africa, the only English speaking section of the world where he has not yet lectured, and will give a series of talks there, "to complete my life's work," he said.

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**IS BEATEN AT BOSTON**

BOSTON, Oct. 2.—Eva Morrison was beaten by Julius Jenson in the swim out Boston Light yesterday. The terms of the match which was for \$250 a side automatically defeated the first of the two to reach the beacon down the harbor.

The former P. I. O. N. S. mermaid signaled that she acknowledged defeat when she was off Castle Island. She had gone five of the 12 miles toward the Light and she was two miles behind Jenson who was off Long Island.
