CLASH ON GERMAN-DUTCH BORDER

Fear Holland Aim Of German Troop Movements

Would Place Warplanes Nearer British Centres—Chamberlain Repeats Determination To Make End Of Hitlerism. (By Pat Ussher, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Nov. 9.—(CP Cable)—Ominous German troop movements behind the Netherlands frontier were reported tonight as hopes of armistice, based on the peace mediation offer of Belgium and Holland, faded into diplomatic history.

Informed Sources Believe Finnish Russian Agreement Near As Talks Continue

(By Jean Champenois, Havas Staff Writer) MOSCOW, Nov. 9.—The impression prevailed in informed quarters here tonight that a Finnish-Russian agreement was in sight, with the Helsinki Government ceding Soviet Russia a naval base at the northern entrance to the Gulf of Finland. The Finnish delegation spent more than an hour in the Kremlin conferring with Joseph Stalin and the Russian premier-foreign commissar, Vyacheslav Molotov.

VAST GERMAN POLICE POWER HUNTS BOMBER

Authorities Silent As Press Charge Jews And British Secret Agent Responsible. (By Edwin Shanke, Associated Press Staff Writer) BERLIN, Nov. 9.—Authorities held a number of persons for questioning tonight as they pressed an investigation into the attempt on Adolf Hitler's life last night at the historic Buergerbrau cellar in Munich. Officials would not say how many were arrested but emphasized their detention did not mean necessarily that charges had been placed against them.

Shooting And Kidnapping In Mysterious Affair

Extraordinary Defence Measures Taken By The Netherlands As Fear Of Invasion Grows. (By Max Harelson, Associated Press Staff Writer) AMSTERDAM, Nov. 9.—(AP)—A mysterious shooting incident on the Netherlands-German frontier in which two persons may have been killed and several abducted into Germany was reported tonight as the Netherlands began precautionary flooding of her vital "water line" defences.

Dominion To Remember Great War Dead

By The Canadian Press As Canada's vast effort to prosecute the second Great War gains momentum, the dominion will pause tomorrow to remember the soldiers who gave their lives in 1914-18. Throughout Canada, members of the Canadian active service forces, now in training for the current struggle in Europe, will parade with veterans of the first Great War in observance of Remembrance Day. In Montreal, the Canadian Legion is holding two memorial services, one in St. James Cathedral and the other at the Cenotaph on Dominion Square. Observance will be on a large scale in Toronto, with the several active service units joining with the veterans for a ceremonial at the Cenotaph in front of the city hall. The Originals' club band will play the music for singing of hymns after the two minutes silence. Speeches for King, empire and peace prayers will follow. Mayor Ralph Day will read the memorial address. Lieutenant-governor Albert Matthews will participate in the observance at the University of Toronto. In Winnipeg also soldiers from mobilized units will join with veterans in honoring the war dead at the city Cenotaph. Many offices and stores in larger centres throughout Manitoba will remain closed for the day. Major General W. A. Griesbach, a member of the senate, will take the salute as 2,000 soldiers of the permanent garrison march past the Cenotaph. Lieutenant-governor J. C. Bowen will take the salute of the marching troops in Calgary. A parade to the Cenotaph also will be held in Lethbridge. Bands will be massed before the Vancouver Cenotaph, with veterans and recruits taking part in the observance. At Blaine, Washington, on the international border, school children of British Columbia and the state of Washington will hold a joint service dedicating a peace arch. In Vancouver, naval and military detachments also will attend ceremonies in Parliament Square and Memorial Park.

Program: REMEMBRANCE DAY, SATURDAY, November 11, 1939. From 10:45 until the first stroke of the eleventh hour, the Fire Bell will toll at intervals of twenty seconds. Parade will leave the Legion Home at 10:40, headed by the Regimental B-band of the Prince Edward Island Light Horse arriving at the Monument at 10:50.

Nine Feet of Debris The rostrum from which he spoke last night lay under a set of debris reaching to a theory that an explosive had been placed directly above where he stood. It required eight hours for rescuers to clear away the wreckage and recover the bodies of the dead. The original reward of 500,000 marks (\$200,000) for information leading to seizure of the perpetuator program for the execution of Hitler was increased to 800,000 marks (\$240,000) by an anonymous offer. Heinrich Himmler, head of all Nazi police forces, tonight offered an additional reward of 300,000 marks (\$120,000) in foreign exchange to anyone abroad providing information leading to the arrest of the assassin.

Nazi Attempts To Pierce Flank Turned Back

PARIS, Nov. 9.—German attempts to pierce the extreme northern flank of the French defence near the Luxembourg border failed today under French counter-fire, according to French counter-espionage reports. A series of night infantry raids was turned back, military sources asserted, without yielding any German territory between the Moselle and Saar Rivers. Authorized commentators declared German activity was entirely local although they said it indicated a renewal of offensive tactics which so far have been defeated. The French evening communique said: "No incident of importance during the day." On the political front, members of the cabinet will meet tomorrow with President Lebrun in Elysee Palace. Apparently by a prearranged signal, military advances said, the Germans struck at four or five French advance posts simultaneously at nightfall last night. Reinforced enemy patrols slipped through the darkness until they reached the isolated positions of the French outpost line. Lighter attacks were described as aimed against a line in the low hills which parallel the frontier between Apach and Merzak. Although the German attacks were heavier than for the last several days, the French said they still were in the preliminary stage. Finance Minister Paul Reynaud assured the United States that her neutrality would never be compromised "by any act of France or her allies." Speaking at the weekly luncheon of the American Club the French minister said Germany's aim in the present conflict was a "total war" while the allied aim was a "total peace." "America has declared herself neutral," he said, "...if American neutrality should ever be compromised it will not be by any act of France or her allies. What we need is not men but arms and raw materials and machines."

Flood Wide Areas

A wide area was flooded through Utrecht Provinces and another reaching eastward between the Maas and Waal Rivers, the Netherlands' first line of defence. Authorized persons said only that "several persons" were involved in the border incident and that "it appears one was hurt and others taken over the German frontier." They acknowledged, however, that versions differed so widely "it is impossible to say at this moment what really happened." They said an inquiry is under way. Witnesses to the clash at the Venloo customs post on the Netherlands-German frontier, said the shooting occurred on a German automobile alighted, crossed the frontier on foot and engaged a machine gun on a Netherlands machine near the customs barrier. One of those said to have been killed was believed to be an occupant of the Netherlands car. The victims and several survivors from this vehicle were reported taken into Germany a few minutes after the shooting. An attempt also was made to push the Netherlands automobile across the frontier but the barrier blocked its passage. Venloo is opposite the German town of Essen, near the top of the Maas river "peninsula", a neck of Netherlands territory which juts between Germany and Belgium.

Tuber Sack Situation Has Improved

Farmers in the Province are resting easier now that the first big rush of potato shipment is complete and the shortage in bags, which was reported earlier, will not affect the shipping of the remainder of this year's crop. At first it was thought that the reported shortage in bags would cause some inconvenience to the farmer in the marketing of his crop. Potato dealers announced yesterday that the amount of bags on hand is sufficient to handle the remaining shipments. Movement in seed potatoes is reported to be good with the price of 65c a bushel still being paid. Mountains remain steady at 50c a bushel and table stock at 45c. Turnips are not moving very rapidly and are only bringing the farmer 12c a bushel. Harvesting of this crop is well advanced and a few fine days will finish it.

War In Quest World Peace Premier Says

Premier Campbell Addresses Canadian-American League At Boston. BOSTON, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Canada took up arms in the present war in quest of peace and security "not only for Europe but for the world," Premier Thane A. Campbell of Prince Edward Island said tonight before the Canadian-American League. The countries annexed by Germany were only the "stepping stones" in a program of vast territorial ambition, the Premier declared at the league's annual dinner, where he was guest of honor. Although he admitted it is untenable for any portion of the British empire, the premier expressed the belief that his country would not have declared a state of war unless
