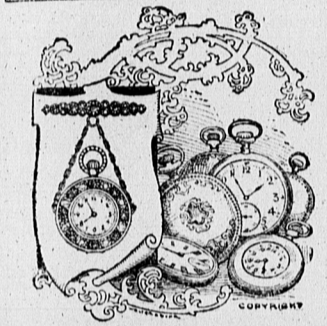

FINANCIAL RECORD, 1911.

The following is the financial statement of this Province as prepared under the late Administration. The expenditures of the year totalled \$416,778.36 and the receipts (less \$10,000 raised by the sale of debentures) amounted to \$374,797.82, so that the deficit shown for the year is \$41,980.54.

The assistance of two leading bankers—Messrs. Dench and Rosborough—has been called in, and an investigation of the accounts is being made. When their report has been received, a further statement will, no doubt, be authorized.
