Reports On Activities At Art Centre

Following is the text of Miss Frances E. Johnston's report to the Art Centre Committee on activities during the latter part of March and the month of April. Miss Johnston is director of the centre.

Approximately 2,500 people have been into the Art Centre in the three months that it has been opened. Some adult groups, finding it a pleasant and convenient place to meet, have used it several times. The School Improvement League met in the Art Centre for the first time this month.

The first session of the children's classes was concluded with a very successful parents' and friends' night, with about 150 persons coming to see the exhibition.

The total enrollment for the first session was over 200 children representing grades one to eight in all the city schools. This enrollment exceeded that which can be adequately accommodated in the facilities we have, and with a staff of one, that it has been necessary to limit the enrollment in the second session (current) to 120.

The children attending the present classes are using interesting facts about Charlottetown for the theme in their work. The group which is learning something of the town's civic affairs visited the City Hall, seeing how the various departments function. Mr. Fullerton, the City Clerk, was very generous with his time, and gave us every consideration in guiding us through the tour. A standing invitation has been made to all the schools to have any of their classes with the teacher visit the art centre when they find it convenient, to see the exhibition being shown and to hear stories about the pictures and artists.

We have received a gift of ten excellent silk screen prints from the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association. They depict scenes from the pulp and paper industry and were specially painted for this series by a number of Canada's outstanding artists. The prints are large, very suitable for schoolroom use, and may be borrowed by anyone who wishes to use them outside the centre.

An exhibition of American prints and lithographs has arrived and will be on view until the latter part of May. It has been made available to us by the London Public Library & Art Museum.

A new series of Thursday evening talks "Flowers in Nature and Art" commenced last week. Mr. W.J. Smith of the West End Nurseries, and Mrs. Gordon MacMillan of Cornwall are acting as speakers, with excellent slide and film material being provided by The Art Gallery of Toronto, The Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and the local branch of the National Film Board.

Mrs. MacMillan will speak this evening Thursday, May 12th at 8.15. She will illustrate her talk "The Garden Through the Seasons" with some of her own colored slides. This meeting is open to everyone who wants to come.

During the month I spoke to the delegates to the recent P.E.I. Teachers' Federation Convention and also to the A.Y.P.A. in Millton who invited me out to speak to them about designing and making scenery for the stage.

An informal get-together for members of the City Council and the Art Centre Committee was held early in April.

Plans are being made to have a summer program commencing in July.

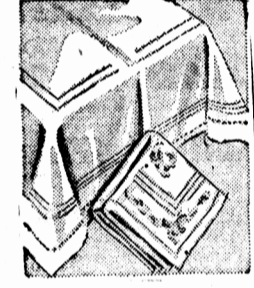
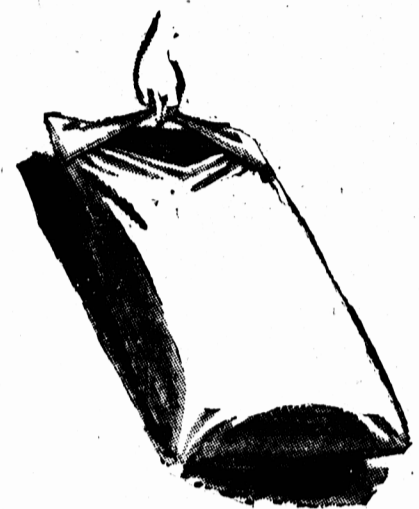
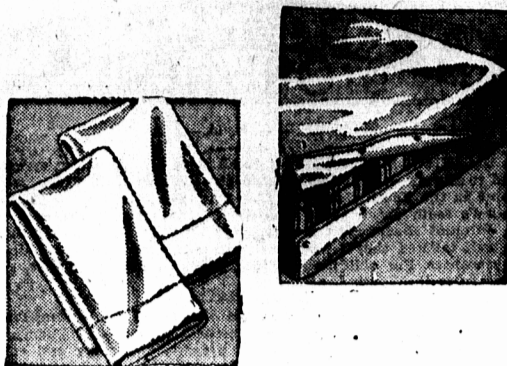
