DEATH OF P. HALLORAN CANADIAN ZIONISTS PLANNING COLONY

The death occurred on Sunday last at his late residence, 95 Fitzroy Street, after a brief illness of only six days, of Peter Halloran of this city. For about six years he had been Water Commissioner for this City, and discharged his duties in a most excellent manner. Mr Halloran was born in Bloomfield, Lot 7, in 1830. There he lived on the old home-stead until he was about sixteen years of age, when he came to Charlottetown. Here he served his apprenticeship as a carriage builder, which trade he followed until about twelve years ago, when he entered the general produce business, which he had conducted up to the time of his death. His wife predeceased him about thirteen years ago. He leaves to mourn, besides a large circle of friends, the following family: Mary, Mrs Francis McCarron; Mrs Bernard Trainor, Angela, all living in this City, and Agnes, in Boston; Sister Cyrian of St John's Convent, Perth Ont.; Mrs John A. Murphy, Kingston, Ont.; also two sons, Edward and Maurice, at home. To the bereaved family The Guardian tenders its most respectful sympathy.

MONTREAL, Jan 2—Among the passengers who left last night to sail on the S.S. Corsican, was Mr Maur Steine, of Montreal. Mr Steine is a member of the Council of the Federation of Zionists of Canada. He will spend the winter on the Nile along the Mediterranean. Mr Steine will look into the colonization scheme by which many destitute Jews have been taken from Russia and placed on farms in Palestine where they soon became prosperous. It is the intention of the Canadian Council to institute a colony to be conducted by capital supplied by Jews in Canada. Mr Steine says it has never been the intention as it is sometimes believed, to send Jews to Palestine and America, but the object has been to provide homes for the destitute and expelled from Russia.

SENATOR COX IS INJURED

TORONTO, Jan. 2—Coming out of the Canada Life Assurance company's office building, on King street, Senator George A. Cox tripped on the carpet Tuesday night and, falling down the steps at the entrance to the building, sustained serious injuries. He received a couple of bad cuts in the head and badly hurt one leg. Falling against the heavy storm door saved the senator from striking the pavement, a fall which might have resulted more seriously. His condition is somewhat improved.

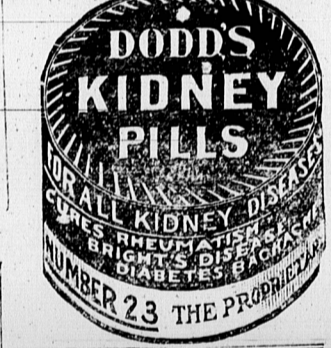

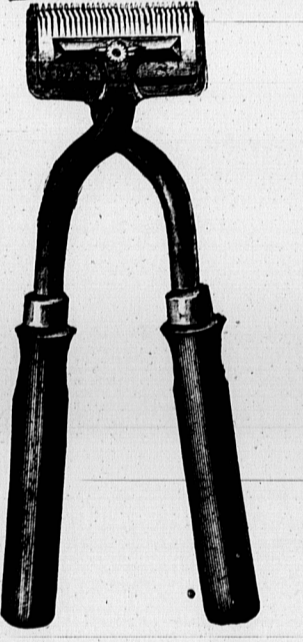
