A SHORT LIFE IS REVEALED—A crow's life may not be always a merry one but sometimes it is short enough. It has been brought to light, on June 25th last a member of the Wood Islands Woodpecker Club banded a young crow, hardly able to fly, at Mr. Ryan, this Province, and on July 8th the same bird was shot by Ernest Currie at Mermaid, five miles away. This brief record of a crow's life was obtained when the Biological Survey of Washington, D. C., and the Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa, requested co-operation of authorities in this Province in an attempt to learn more about the crow, considered a bit of a "pirate" by many farmers. Last summer a number of the birds were banded by R.C.M.P. in an attempt to find how far south the birds migrate in winter and how long they live and other facts which banding brings to light. Why crow, 90057, the one banded at Mt. Ryan was shot was not revealed, but possibly it was for stealing sprouting corn or chickens. In rate his life was a very short one. Banding operations would be continued in this Province during the coming summer and ducks will be included, it was announced.

Accused In Burglary Case Are Remanded

John King and Gerald Gallant appearing in City Police Court Saturday morning for preliminary hearing on charges of burglary were remanded until Wednesday.

Fred Worth, first witness, who sleeps in the building which houses the McPhee Grocery, testified that on the night of January 7 he was roused from sleep by noises in the shop below. He saw two men going back and forth from a brick house across the street and heard glass breaking. He roused others in the house and Mrs. Lila Yeo set out to warn McPhee Bros. After she left a short time the men came back and then a scream and rushed downstairs to see a man in dark clothes running down Prince Street. The police arrested and brought Jack King out of the house across the street from which the two men he saw had been operating.

Mrs. Lila Yeo, next witness said she had been awakened by Worth about 3 p. m. After watching at the upstairs window she saw the men go across the street. One wore a light cap and a windbreaker and the other a dark cap and a heavy coat. The other was dressed in dark clothes. She went downstairs to warn McPhee and heard a whistle from the corner when she reached the street. She glanced into the shop and saw a light on. Rushing to the door she met a man coming out. She exclaimed, "We got you now," but the man threw a sack into her face and raved her a punch knocking her down on the sidewalk. She screamed, the witness said, and the man ran away. The accused Gallant, resembled the man, Mrs. Yeo said.

The case concluded the evidence taken Saturday.

A warrant was remanded and an Ex parte Act case adjourned until Tuesday.

Famous Violinist In Kinsmen Install

A very fine programme of violin selections will be offered the music lovers of Charlottetown by Mr. Maurice LeBlanc who will give a recital here on Tuesday the 17th January. He was a pupil of the late August Bruch, who first studied violin in Montreal under Prof. Gilbert, a pupil of Cesar Thomson of Liege, Belgium. He has entered the New England Conservatory as a pupil of Richard Burgin, Concert Master of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, as well as a pupil of Felix Wintermiller of Paris.

In 1930 Mr. LeBlanc was awarded a scholarship by the French Government and became a pupil of Jacques Thibaud and George Enescu of Paris.

In time he was awarded the highest honors by the "Ecole Normale de Music" of Paris.

After eight years on the Continent he is giving a series of recitals to pay for his violin for which he paid \$10,000.

He has the highest commendation from such music critics as Maurice Imbert, L'Art Musical, Paris, George Mussy, L'Espresso, Paris, Le Monde Musical, Paris, Professor Hamer, Mt. Allison Conservatory and many others.
