I.—Mr. and Mrs. Ambrose Corcoran, of Plusville, had as their guests, last week, the latter's nephew, Reverend Edwin Kinch, Reverend Michael Delahanty and Brother Cuhane all of the Servite order in the Chicago area. They flew from Chicago and are continuing their journey to Johannesburg, Africa, to initiate missionary activity in that country. Probe Strange Tale Of Barefoot Walk By Elderly People

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 12 (CP)—The strange tale of two elderly sisters and a brother coming a wealthy Boston background who walked barefooted 90 miles from Toronto to Niagara Falls was being investigated today by officials of the Salvation Army. Apparently destitute, the trio—Ethel Jean, Grace Lyall and Robert B. Kellie—said they had been living on dry bread for three days. Their ages range from 59 to 62. Exhausted and hungry after their week-long trek, they arrived here pulling a small wagon containing all their possessions and lived in Queen Victoria Park for three nights before they were disturbed by police. Adjutant A. Rankin of the Salvation Army said there was a possibility the three are wealthy. They claim to be descendants of a Boston family, socially prominent at the turn of the century, with property holdings "in the hands of an American agent." Until two years ago, cheques from their American estate reached them where they migrated after death of their parents, they said. When the cheques stopped—so their story goes—the trio used what money they had for tickets to Toronto. The barefoot journey to Niagara started after unsuccessful attempts to sell pictures painted by Robert Kellie. Adjutant Rankin, who provided them with food and lodgings last night, quoted the trio as having told him they had been "squeezed out of property and bequests from rich relatives in the United States."
