...UNITED BAPTIST CONFERENCE.—The eighty-seventh session of the United Baptist Quarterly Conference was held in the Baptist Church, Montague on Tuesday and Wednesday, March 13th and 14th. The general purpose of it, kept steadily in view throughout, was to advance one stage further, the working out of the Five Year Programme as adopted by the United Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces last October. The leading features were an introductory sermon pointing out the churches' duty in the matter, delivered by the Rev. C. R. Freeman; also an address by Mr. J. P. Gordon urging that Protestants in general and Baptists in particular, should give more attention than they have done hitherto to educational matters in this island. A very practical address by Rev. L. E. Ackland on "Methods of Working out the Five Year Programme," an enthusiastic Ladies' Missionary Meeting in which the training of children was dealt with most impressively by Mrs. F. A. Atkinson; short addresses by Rev. F. N. Atkinson, P. A. Hubley and others on Young People's Societies; and an evangelistic discourse by Rev. E. P. Carter on the last words of the Bible, Rev. 22:1. The following resolutions were moved and passed unanimously: (1) Resolved that we the members of the P. E. Island Baptist Quarterly again place ourselves on record as strenuously opposed to the pernicious laxity in the enforcement of the Provincial Prohibition law, which laxity has already been openly condemned by the Grand Jury, and by Chief Justice Sullivan. (3) That whereas our Bro. Rev. L. E. Ackland of Summerside is about to go from us to another province we the officers and members of this Conference hereby express our deep regret at his departure and our most hearty approval of his person and work, and we pray that the Divine blessing may rest upon him in his new sphere of labor. (3) That the best thanks of the Conference be tendered to the Montague Church for their kind hospitality. The meetings were well attended throughout.


