CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. Our Managers have knowledge of each local situation and are in touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

Canada has reached the actual commencement of the harvesting season, with the prospects still good for generally satisfactory crops in every province of the Dominion. In the Prairie Provinces grain is ripening rapidly and it is expected that in Manitoba harvesting will be general next week.

Although showers have fallen over much of the grain-growing area, further general rains are needed to aid filling, particularly in Saskatchewan and Alberta. There is still ample water.

Canada At War Twenty Years Ago Written For The Canadian Press By Capt. W. W. Murray, M.C. As it was long beginning to end with drama, the Great War nevertheless produced nothing that combined to a greater degree all the elements of surprise and excitement than the Battle of Amiens. Like most dramatic establishments of what appear to be established conditions, however, this was the consequence of meticulous planning of wise staff work and of intelligent and spirited co-operation on the part of the troops.

Plan Decisive Action The preliminary operations at Villers-Cotterets, in the Champagne, on July 18, which saw American troops engaged for the first time in substantial numbers, revealed that the Allies had regained their offensive power. Foch had secured a considerable advantage from the attacks of the French and British armies, and this was being followed by an explosion with a blow against the Germans at Amiens. But, as at Villers-Cotterets, his intentions had to be kept secret.

Province of Ontario Rain has been fairly general during the past week, and while delaying the harvest, it has been beneficial to growing crops and pastures. Army mow infestation and rust have caused some damage in a few sections. Cutting of fall wheat, barley and early oats is well advanced, with satisfactory yields of good quality indicated.

Maritime Provinces Wet weather continued during the past week and while crops generally are making good progress, there is an excess of moisture in many districts and dry sunny weather is now needed. Grains now at the heading-out stage show satisfactory progress. When having commenced in mid-July, the crop promised to be a heavy one, but the moisture and heavy rain has caused some damage in quality and tonnage are widespread. Potatoes and other roots are well advanced. Notwithstanding adverse conditions, apples are sizing well and an average crop is indicated. Blueberries are plentiful and of good quality. Grass pastures continue in excellent condition.
