A meeting of the Executive of the Prince Edward Island Silver Fox Breeders' Association was held yesterday afternoon in the office of Mr. E. R. Brown.

In the absence of Mr. Fred L. Rogers, who was elected President at the recent annual meeting, Mr. E. R. Brown, Vice President for Queen's County was on motion authorized to perform the duties of President.

After a general discussion with reference to the habit, on the part of companies and individuals, of advertising their stock as classified when no registration has been effected, the Secretary was instructed to advise such that they are injuring themselves as well as the general fox industry as prospective customers are informed through the Association as to what stock is registered, and claims not substantiated by proper proof are justly regarded as fraudulent.

The Secretary was instructed to secure offices at once and have them suitably furnished so as to afford better opportunities to give necessary publicity to the business and furnish such information as the public are now constantly demanding.

Since the annual meeting held in Summerside on the 4th inst., a number of companies, including some to the other provinces have applied for registration.
