

Kiner Hits 6th Homer Of Season As Pirates Defeat Dodgers 4-2

(By The Canadian Press)
 Ralph Kiner, last year's National League homerun co-title holder, led the Pirates to a 4-2 triumph over the Brooklyn Dodgers. The Boston Braves shut out the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-0 in the only game played in the N.L.

Elmer Riddle limited the Dodgers to five hits, including a homer by Bruce Edwards in the fourth. The night game drew 31,385 fans. Riddle won his third straight game as he struck out five Dodgers.

Kiner, who collected three of the six Pirate hits off Erv Palca, scored Stan Rojek ahead of him in the third inning when he belted a 40-foot homer. In the eighth, he smashed a double to again, drive Rojek across the plate.

The Pirates got their first run in the second when Dan Murtagh scored on a double steal. Consecutive doubles by Dick Whitman and Palca in the third inning gave the Dodgers their first run.

Johnny Sain, strong-armed right hander of Boston Braves, snapped the five-game winning streak of St. Louis Cardinals.

Although giving up 10 hits, nine of them singles, Sain was strong in the clutch and the Cards were never in the game after he belted an early lead. Earl Torgeson potted a three-run homer in the third inning.

Much Enthusiasm At Annual Meeting Of Rifle Association

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Rifle Association was held in the City Hall last evening. There was a large attendance and great interest shown and the feeling was that 1948 would see a great extension of rifle shooting with more participants than in any previous year. A larger prize list with two new matches that will mean a three-day shoot instead of two, more encouragement to new shooters, the availability of good rifles and sights as well as more help to cadets will all be features of this season.

The meeting was presided over by the president, Lt.-Col. D.A. MacKinnon, D.S.O., whose address appears below. The financial report was read by the secretary-treasurer, Lt.-Col. W.J. MacDonald, E.D., who gave in details the receipts and expenditures. Among the former was \$160 interest on 100 shares of International Nickel (common), the gift to the Association by Major J.M. Jones to maintain the Jones Memorial Match in perpetuity.

Col. MacKinnon also reported the receipt of \$100 from Harold F. Stanfield, Ltd., advertising agency, Montreal. This was authorized by the Macdonald Tobacco Co., Montreal, who sponsored British Consols team matches formerly. This year the \$100 will be part of a fund to be used for the Macdonald Brier or British Consols match (whichever name the Company prefers). It will be one of the feature matches of the annual meet.

Another match from another donor is under consideration and donors of cups and trophies from last year who were present renewed them for 1948.

Range To Open May 15

Col. W.W. Reid, D.S.O., who assisted so much last year, was at the meeting and promised to have the range open for practice on May 15. He stated that rifles would be available and every support given to those who desired to take up rifle shooting seriously and were members of militia units.

The colonel also promised to use his best endeavours to have the Bungalow ready for the annual prize meeting in July. This was in the plans for last year but there was so much other work it could not be completed.

A motion was moved and carried to make available \$100 to assist in maintaining six cadets who will be qualified to attend the D.C.R.A. meet in Ottawa in August. That Association will furnish the transportation.

The report of the Inter-Maritime team was read by the captain, Major A.F. Gormley, who described the match and gave the scores for the various ranges. It will be remembered that Prince Edward Island won by quite a large margin from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Lt.-Col. W.J. MacDonald, E.D., reported for the Ottawa team whose exploits are partially mentioned in the president's report. Col. MacDonald stated that two former Islanders, Col. Weatherbie and Athol Seaman, and also Col. Snyder of Alberta, who is the donor of the Snyder Trophy, made pleasant calls and took a great interest in the Island team. Athol Seaman won the life membership match at the shoot, scoring a possible at 900 yards. For several years he was one of the best local riflemen and figured prominently on inter-maritime teams.

Indians Make Clean Sweep Of Three-Game Series With Red Sox

 Manager Lou Boudreau started a triple-play and Larry Doby and Joe Gordon poled home runs yesterday as Cleveland Indians made a clean sweep of a three-game series with the Boston Red Sox 12-7.

Boudreau launched the triple-killing when pinch-hitter Bill Goodman lined to him in the eighth inning. The Indians' pilot doubled up Wally Moses at second base and gave Gordon ample time to nail Birdie Tabetts off first.

The Indians greeted starter Dave (Boo) Ferriss with a three-run blasting in the first inning on Thurman Tucker's leadoff triple, a Doby two-bagger, a single and three bases on balls as they batted around.

Ferriss departed after the second when Doby poled a tremendous drive into the right field stands and Gordon blasted into the Cleveland bull pen with Boudreau aboard.

Lefty Maurice McDermott took over the Boston mound and, after being hit hard, was yanked in the eighth to set the stage for the triple-play.
 The uncommon play came after relief pitcher Ed Klemm, who was rushed into action in the third inning, passed Moses and Tabetts singled.
 Stan Spence's two-on homer against Allen Gettel pulled the Red Sox back on even terms with the Indians the first time the Soxers came to bat and they added their last three in the ninth at the expense of Klemm and Steve Gromek.

Halifax And District League Ball Teams Begin To Take Shape

HALIFAX, May 10 (CP)—Baseball club officials were behaving like stock brokers in a boom-town today as the Halifax and District League began to take shape for the coming season.

Determined to form another top-flight team around the nucleus of the squad that copped the Maritime championship last year, Dartmouth Arrows were getting their throwing arms in shape by vigorous handshakes with their first three imports from south of the border.

They were the Halifax Arrows last year, but have since migrated across the harbor to become the Dartmouth Arrows for 1948.

Pitcher Charlie Greene, catcher Charlie Shauls and centre-fielder Milton Neale were the three new arrivals.

Shauls, who says he is 30, was with the Arrows last year and will share the catching chore with Irving (Peaches) Ruven.

Strictly newcomers to the Halifax squad are Neale and Greene, 18 years old and six-foot-two, comes to the Arrows on the recommendation of Chicago Cubs.

A 21-year-old Negro outfielder, Neale has been recommended by a major league scout as a sizzling base runner.

Negotiations for another American pitcher could bring Arrows pitching staff to five. Regulars O'Colne, Staples and Moulaison are back for the coming season.

Manager Les Vail of the Kentville Wildcats has announced that nine United States players recently came to terms with the club.

Other teams in the League are Halifax Capitals, Middleton Cardinals and Liverpool Larruppers.

Although reluctant to disclose names of possible imports, Vail said one of his recent telephone contacts was with a 27-year-old former major league catcher.

A pitcher from the Southern Association was also reported on the list of Wildcat prospectives.
