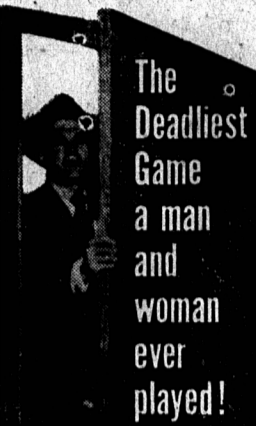

A special meeting of the Georgetown Community Welfare League was held in the Town Hall on Thursday, the 3rd. Vice-president F.J. Solomon occupied the chair. The meeting heard a report from chairman J.P. Johnson and committee members who had previously interviewed the mayor and council on the community recreational centre project. Discussion took place re the purchasing of standing lumber by the League. The meeting was then adjourned until Monday, March 7th which is the annual meeting of the League. At this meeting it is hoped for a capacity attendance of members, as many matters vital to the work of the League will be discussed.

Mayor P.L. Boudreau called his full Council together Thursday evening in a special meeting, at which a seven-man delegation from the Georgetown Community Welfare League attended and presented a brief to the Council on the subject of the erection of a community welfare recreational centre. Following the reading of the brief, a lengthy discussion took place in which all members of the council and the delegation presented their views on the project. The Council was thus furnished with a very clear picture and provided with such necessary information for their deliberations on the matter. The Mayor assured the delegation that at the next regular meeting of the Council, their proposition would be given serious and sympathetic consideration and that the delegation would again be asked to meet with the council at a special meeting to receive the reply of the Town's governing body. Prior to meeting the delegation the Mayor reported to the Council on the results of the recently held meeting of mayors, which His Honor and Town Clerk, Captain G.M. Fitzgerald attended. Uniform by-laws are to be drawn up for the several towns coming under the act, with authority given each Town to amend those to meet any specific situation peculiar to that town which might arise. The section of the Act which necessitated the citizens in front of whose properties sidewalks might be laid, paying half the cost of laying such walks, is to be amended and the Town granted the privilege of paying for such construction out of general revenue. This has been the general custom in the past. A vitally important change also to be made will provide for the posting of the Town's voters lists in a prominent place prior to the four clear days, before the holding of the Magistrate's Court on the voters lists. The Mayor also read a letter to the Hon. George H. Harbour, requesting assistance in snow removal from the Town's streets, to facilitate the movement of fire fighting equipment, oil and transfer trucks and hospital patients. The clerk read a copy of a letter to Mr. W.N. MacDonald, coal mine operator of Mabou, N.S., offering him the fullest co-operation and assistance in his proposed plan to set up a coal distributing centre in Georgetown.
