**SCIENTISTS SET AT ALCOHOLISM**

McGill University To Back Committee

Dr. A. Gordon, speaking at the Dominion Douglas Church yesterday, announced that a Montreal Committee for Education on Alcoholism now is being organized in the city, with the support of the medical faculty of McGill University.  
He said the committee would operate a clinic out of McGill, under the supervision of a physician, a psychiatrist and a social worker will work on solving the local liquor problem.  
It was hoped, he added, that this committee and clinic will have the assistance of the Alcoholism Anonymous group, and religious organizations.  
This, it is believed, is the first attempt on the part of any city in Canada to tackle the problem of alcohol along the scientific lines sponsored by Yale University in the United States.  
Dr. Gordon said that the value of this plan had already been proven by Yale, where thousands of prominent United States citizens, interested in the rehabilitation of the alcoholic, have studied under the Yale Plan of Alcohol Studies. He appealed to Montrealers to help in the plan to scientifically what has become the fourth greatest health problem in the Dominion.  
By the time you receive this letter the work for the year in the United States will be ended. As our Provincial Convention was held so short a time ago, we have decided to hold a full executive in June and one regular Provincial Convention a year from June. **Rules of Contest**

- Contest is open to anyone living outside of city or town limits.
- Contestants must abide by the decision of the judge in his or her county.
- All entries to the contest must be made by Saturday, May 4th, 1946.
- An entry fee of 50c must accompany application, and be mailed to Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown.
- Initial judging will be made as early as roads and conditions will allow. Final judging will take place 15-31 August inclusive, 1946.
- The Department of Agriculture will appoint a judge, other than the county judges, to judge first prize winners of each of the three counties to decide winner of the Governor's cup.
- All work done or partially completed in spring of 1946, prior to initial judging will be noted by judge and contestant will receive marks for same at time of final judging.
- Planting of native trees will receive same marks as imported ornaments.
- A reduction of nursery stock of at least 20% below catalogue prices will be available to all contestants in 1947.
- NOTE: Full particulars will be given in the press at a later date regarding rule No. 9.
- Trophies to be competed for annually. Miniature cups will be retained by those who have received trophies.
- Time for white-washing, up to 100 lbs. will be supplied free to each contestant provided it is used for same.
- NOTE: Secure your necessary lime from your local dealer and ask him to send bill to Department of Agriculture. Please do not ask for 100 lbs. if 50 lbs. will do.
- Prizes may be made in cash, nursery stock, or paint.
- NOTE: If prizes are awarded in nursery stock, or color and brand of paint.

**Scoring Basis**

Based on One Hundred Points, with eight hedges, as follows:

- (a) Planting, whitewashing, and repairs made to buildings.
- (b) Planting of trees, hedges, shrubs, etc.
- (c) Removal of irreparable buildings, dead trees, rubbish, and weeds.
- (d) Tidiness.
- (e) Lawns.
- (f) Fences around buildings.
- (g) Flowers.
- (h) General improvement in appearance.
