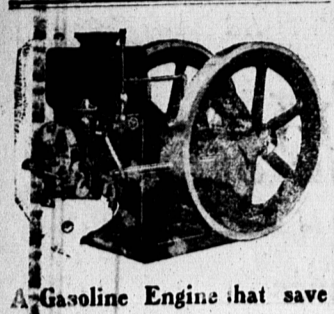

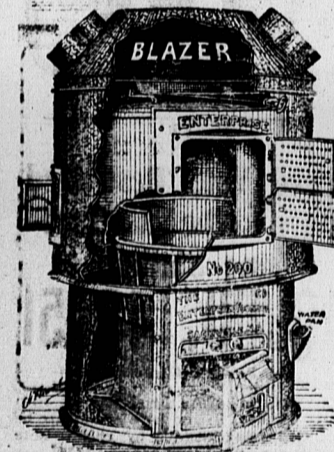

THE CZAR VISITS HESSE.

FRIDBERG, Hesse, Sept. 1.—Emperor Nicholas and Empress Alexandra of Russia arrived here safely at 3.30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Their Majesties were accompanied in to German territory by a suite of fifty persons. Before the arrival of the Imperial train great crowds gathered in the streets in hopes of having a view of the visitors. They were not disappointed, for the Emperor and Empress were driven from the railway station to the castle which they will occupy while here in an automobile. Their suite also followed in open motor-cars. The Russian secret police have been here for several days, on the lookout for anarchists, and last night at Bad Nauheim took into custody a Russian named Manelburg. Shortly before the Royal party arrived yesterday, the police arrested another man who is believed to be an anarchist. It is estimated that no less than fifty Russian and German political agents are now in Friedberg and adjacent places. As is invariably the case when Royalties travel, sensational rumors are afloat of impending and actual harm to the visitors. The arrival, however, of their Majesties was attended with no unpleasant incident.

MISS LE NEVE ALSO IN HOSPITAL NOW.

NERVES GIVE WAY.

LONDON, Sept. 1.—Close on the heels of the collapse of Dr. H. H. Crippen, his co-defendant, Ethel Clara Le Neve, yesterday was removed from her cell in the Holloway jail to the jail hospital. James H. Wellare, her solicitor, secured permission to visit her this afternoon. It was given out that the cause was the same as that which compelled the putting of Crippen in the Brighton jail hospital. The report that their removal was a ruse to prevent any attempts at suicide and to make sure that the means for such an act could not be smuggled in the food sent by friends, was revived when the change was made in the girl's surroundings. In the hospital they have no choice but to eat the hospital fare.

A STARVED STOWAWAY.

MONTREAL, Sept. 1.—An unconscious man was found in the hold of the Mount Temple today, when the work of unloading commenced. The boat sailed from Antwerp several days ago, and from all appearances the stowaway had been without food for days. An empty water bottle was all that was found on him.
